

# Louis ignites Rebel kickers' offense

Richard Louis is a second-year forward who is leading a very young Rebel team into the 1991 campaign. Louis has tallied two goals and one assist in two games already this season. He is happy with those numbers but is disappointed with the team's 1-1 record. He feels the team overlooked Division II Seattle Pacific in the championship game of the Coors Light Invitational.

"We took them lightly because they were a Division II team and they came in and beat us," Louis said. Taking them lightly resulted in a 3-0 loss for the Rebels.

A former Player of the Year in New Mexico and Parade All-American in 1989, Louis came to UNLV because of the competition of the schedule as well as his respect for the coaching staff. "Coach Barto came to

my house and talked to my family," Louis said, "I also liked his intense coaching style."

Louis said his strengths as a player are his speed and quickness.

"There are not a lot of defenders who can keep up with me," Louis said.

Louis used his skills during the off-season this year as he led the West team to second place finish at the U.S. Olympic Festival.

When asked about personal goals for the season, Louis put the team ahead of personal glory. The main goal for the season is to earn a trip to the NCAA tournament, he said.

For future goals he added that he would like to play professionally if possible either in the United States or overseas. If that doesn't come about, Louis said he would like to go into big business and "make lots of money."

By halftime the Rebels had made 11 attempts at the goal to Harvard's two. The score was tied 0-0 at the half.

The Rebels could not capitalize on their second half chances as Louis and Mike Madrid both missed shots.

The Crimson finally scored the games first goal at the 70:08 mark.

The Rebels had a good chance to equalize two minutes later off an indirect kick but their offense did not connect at the goal.

Harvard went up 2-0 five minutes later.

The Rebels were shut out despite out shooting their opponents 22-5.

Head coach Barry Barto was pleased with the offensive performance despite the loss.

"We had more chances, played better, but two mistakes in our defense cost us," Barto said.

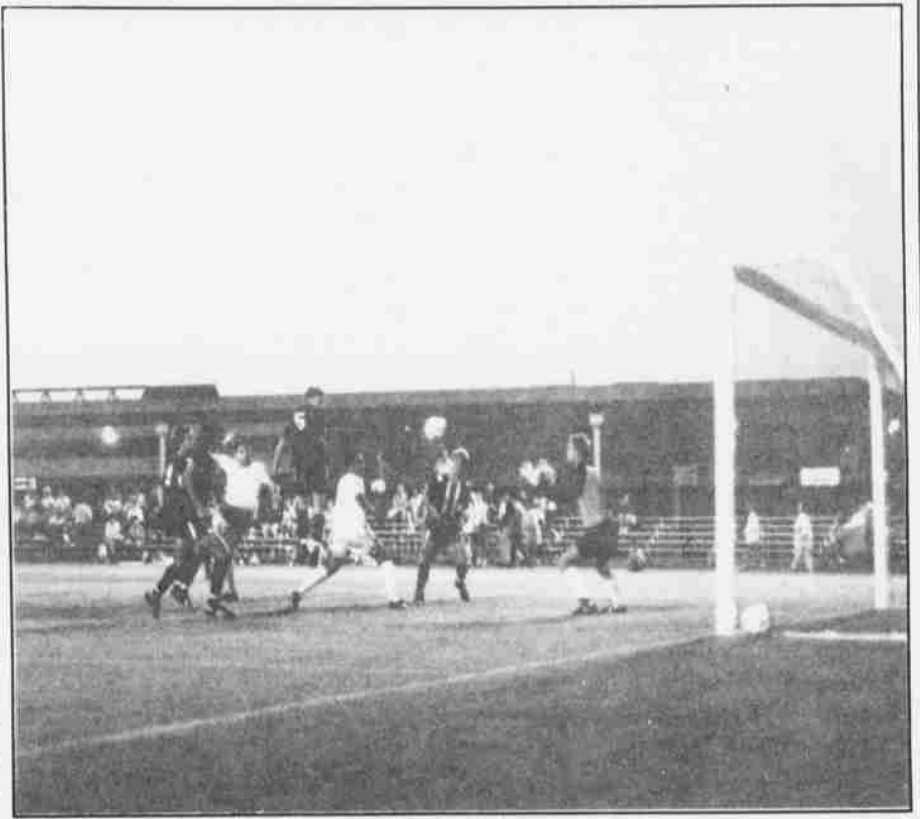

After playing No. 6 singles last year, Hostalek figures to play a higher position for his senior year. He recently teamed with Aanes to win the Green Valley doubles title over local pros and former UNLV greats Jeff Foley and John McCauley.

Las Vegas native Lorin Entzel is also returning for his senior year. The hard-hitting Entzel has been a strong doubles player for UNLV since his freshman year.

Strother said, "Lorin's been an impact doubles player for us for three years and I think he's ready to have the same impact in singles this year".

Junior Kenji Hall is, in

the words of Coach Strother, "The most team-oriented player on the squad. He consistently puts the team ahead of himself. Kenji has the highest grade-point average on the team and is on academic scholarship here at the university".

Other returnees include super sophomore Mike Bastin and junior Dave Cohen. As a freshman, Bastin gained valuable experience last year and is expected to be a factor this year. Cohen returns after missing most of last year with shoulder problems.

The three newcomers this year are a diverse group. Jeremy Eastmond, from London is a standout doubles player and should contribute immediately. South African Wayne Bowyer will make a run at the top six, while Las Vegas Matt Rivera will redshirt this year.
