Homecoming: Rebels face Long Beach State

UNLV will open its 1991 Big West Conference schedule as it hosts the Long Beach State 49ers at 7 p.m. Saturday, at the Sam Boyd Silver Bowl. The game will be the Rebels' Homecoming.

The Rebels are 2-2 in non-conference play and are coming off of a 40-13 defeat at the hands of Washington State last week at the Silver Bowl.

The 49ers are 0-1 in the conference and 0-4 on the season. They are led by first year coach Willie Brown

who replaces George Allen who, at age 72, died shortly after last season. Brown was the 49ers defensive back coach under Allen last year.

The 49ers were beaten by the Arizona Wildcats last week 45-21, in Tucson. Red-

shirt quarterback Mike McCoy completed 18 of 41 passes for 187 yards and one touchdown. Freshman tailback Terrel Davis led the team in rushing with 76 yards on 11 attempts, in the losing effort.

Soccer team hosts Coors Light Classic

The UNLV soccer team will open its Big West Conference home season as it hosts the Coors Light Soccer Classic Friday and Sunday at Peter Johann Memorial Field.

The Rebels will face the (5-3-0, 1-2-0) UC Irvine Anteaters on Friday and the (1-7-0, 1-1-0) Titans of Cal State Fullerton on Sunday. UNLV, (4-4-0, 0-1-0) is 6-2 in eight previous Big West home openers.

The Rebels are coming off of two one-point losses at the hands of UCLA and Cal State Fullerton last week. The Rebels scored only two goals in the losses. The Rebels are led by Daniel Barber and Richie Louis who have six and five goals each.

The UC Irvine Anteaters are led by junior forward Kevin Smith who has three goals on the year and is ranked sixth in the conference in scoring and second in assists with five. The Rebels have never lost or

tied UC Irvine in 11 previous matches.

The UC Santa Barbara Gauchos are led by senior goalie Ryan Sparre who has a 1.57 goal-against average. Though the Gauchos are 1-7, six matches this season have been decided by one goal. The Rebels have a one-game series lead at 9-8-4 over the Gauchos.

The Rebels will play the UC Irvine Anteaters at 7 p.m. on Friday and the UC Santa Barbara Gauchos at 1 p.m. on Sunday.

UNLV soccer team's Barber leads by example

Daniel Barber tied the UNLV single season assist record in his freshman year and he was ready to lead Team Rebel to success in his sophomore season. His soccer career at UNLV was just beginning.

That all changed in the fifth game of his sophomore year. He had just scored the game tying goal against league rival Fresno State when he tore ligaments in his knee and was lost for most of the season.

"I had already played in too many games so I couldn't redshirt," Barber said. "It was a very disappointing season for me."

The knee is 100 percent now and he is playing better than ever. Through eight games this year, he has six goals and two assists. He is happy with these numbers, but thinks he can become a better all around player.

"I would rather have less goals and more assists if that would help

the team win," he said. "I think the team knows what it takes to win but we just need to be more consistent from game to game."

After his playing days were over at Pacifica High School in Garden Grove, Calif., Barber decided to come to UNLV instead of UCLA and San Diego State.

"I wanted to go to a school where I could play right away," Barber said. "If I went to some other schools I probably would have had to wait a year before I would have gotten a chance to play." He also said he liked head coach Barry Barto because he is a player's coach.

Although his UNLV career is far from over, Barber is thinking about the future. "I want to win a Big West title and lead the team into the NCAA play-offs."

As for personal goals, Barber would like to be considered for the U.S. Olympic team. "I need to play well for the whole season and then maybe I will get looked at," he

said. "We need to play well as a team to get exposure for guys like Scott Uderitz, Richie Louis and me to be considered."

After graduating from UNLV, Barber would like to pursue playing professionally. Ideally he would like to play in the United States, but he would play anywhere. After soccer he would like to open his own sports bar and reflect on his soccer career.



UNLV golfers take third at New Mexico

The No. 3-ranked UNLV golf team finished third in the 37th-annual William H. Tucker Intercollegiate. Arizona won the tournament with a three-round score of 849, Oklahoma State finished second at 855; the Rebels finished 14 shots back.

The tournament was held at the 7,300-yard, par-72 University of New Mexico South Course, Monday and Tuesday.

South Carolina's David

Seawell finished six under par, beating Phil Mickelson of Arizona State by two strokes to win the individual title. The highest UNLV finisher was sophomore Edward Fryatt, a transfer from Brigham Young, who tied for 14th. Fryatt shot 72 in all three rounds to finish at 216 for the tournament, six shots back of Seawell.

The Rebels' Warren Schutte, Monte Montgomery and Brandon Goethals all shot 217 for the tournament to tie for 20th place. Darrin Osborn finished tied for 25th

with a 218 score.

Arizona's team total (849) was a 54-hole record for the tournament. The Tucker Intercollegiate has been a 54-hole tournament since 1988.

The Rebels return to Albuquerque, N.M., Monday and Tuesday for the 15-team Preview Invitational. UNLV finished fourth in last year's Preview. No. 1 Arizona State, No. 2 Oklahoma State, No. 4 Arizona, No. 6, No. 7 Clemson, No. 8 North Carolina and No. 9 Wake Forest will be among the field.
