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because you are having your period," Caldicott said. She directed this statement to men and pointed out that biological differences between the sexes are no reason for derogatory statements.

"I complained about my sexual harassment and the press said 'sour grapes,'" said Caldicott.

She was introduced by Linda White, the president of the Las Vegas Rainbow Coalition. White spoke on human rights and on the current Senate hearing.

"I am angered and frustrated at the mockery that has gone on in these United States for the last three days," said White in reference to the recent Senate hearing.

Caldicott quickly picked up where White left off.

"Either Anita Hill or Linda White should run for the next President of the United States," Caldicott said.

She expressed concern for the depth and gravity of suffering by women due to the yoke of sexual harass-

ment.

"I think that women suffer from an apartheid far more profound and subtle than that endured by the blacks in South Africa," Caldicott said.

Caldicott was morose in discussing the problems of nuclear waste disposal and nuclear weapons. She described the philosophy be-

and weaponry. She stated that where the planet is concerned she would gladly sacrifice her own life for her children and grandchildren.

"I think that in trying to save the earth we may have to face our own death," said Caldicott.

"I don't know what you're going to have to do to shut down the bloody test site," she said.

"You may have to place yourself on the line."

hind nuclear arms buildup as, "sociopathic thinking or maybe psychopathic thinking."

"The number one priority of George Bush should be to eliminate nuclear weapons," said Caldicott.

Caldicott vividly discussed nuclear waste disposal. She explained that the half-life of plutonium is virtually "forever" at 34,000 years.

"Where are you going to put it? The truth is 'God only knows,'" said Caldicott.

She was emphatic when describing the price we may have to pay to eliminate the threat of nuclear disposal

"The reason the administration gets away with what it does is because they play upon our fears," she said.
