Columnist Art Buchwald to speak

Pulitzer Prize-winning columnist Art Buchwald is scheduled to speak at the university on Nov. 21 as part of the Barrick Lecture Series.

The lecture, titled "The Mother of All Columnists," is set for 7:30 p.m. in Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall.

The event is free, but tickets are required. Tickets will be available beginning Saturday at the Performing Arts Center box office at Ham Concert Hall. Box office hours are 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. weekdays, and 10 a.m. - 4 p.m. Saturdays. The box office phone number is 739-3801.

Buchwald, who began his professional writing career in Paris in the late 1940s, received a Pulitzer Prize for "Outstanding Commentary" in 1982.

A native of Mount Vernon, N.Y., who grew up in the New York City borough of Queens, Buchwald dropped out of high school to join the Marines during World War II.

After leaving the service in 1945, he enrolled at the University of Southern California, where he was managing director of the campus humor magazine, wrote a column for the college newspaper, and wrote a variety show called "No Love Atoll."

Leaving USC in 1948 without a degree, he took a \$250 check he had received as a war bonus and bought a one-way ticket to France. When his money ran out he got a job as a correspondent for "Variety" magazine in Paris.

In 1949, he took a sample column filled with offbeat snippets about Parisian night life to the offices of the European edition of the New York Herald Tribune. He was hired. His "Paris After Dark" column caught on quickly, and eventually was followed by another column, "Mostly About People."

In 1952, the Herald Tribune decided to bring Buchwald's column to American readers under the title "Europe's Lighter Side."

Although based in Paris, Buchwald traveled around Europe to gather material for his column. He once marched in a May Day parade in East Berlin. On another occasion he traveled to Turkey to get a first-hand impression of a Turkish bath.

Buchwald returned to the United States in 1962. His column currently appears in 550 newspapers in the United States and abroad.

He also is the author of several books, most of which are collections of his columns and other writings. Among the books are, "And Then I Told the President," "I Never Danced at the White House," "While Reagan Slept," and "Whose Rose Garden Is It Anyway?"

In 1986, Buchwald was elected to the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters.

Exercise study volunteers needed

The exercise physiology laboratory is seeking volunteers for two physical fitness studies.

For the first study, men and women from 36 to 55 years of age are needed. For the second study, women from 21 to 35 years of age and from 45 to 65 years of age are needed.

The first study will measure four areas of physical fitness— aerobic fitness, muscular strength and endurance, flexibility, and body composition. The body composition portion of the study will determine each participant's percentage of body fat.

One 30-minute session is required and will be scheduled at the participant's convenience. In exchange for participating, subjects will receive a fitness evaluation.
