

Buchwald spends some quality time with students

Unlike some speakers who come to campus and find they don't have enough time to mingle with students, famous columnist Art Buchwald demanded it.

Wednesday, Buchwald lunched with editors from *The Yellin' Rebel* at the Dining Commons. That evening he had dinner with members of Student Government.

Wednesday and Thursday afternoons he spent an hour with Communications Studies majors giving them plenty of advice and laughs.

Buchwald told students to start looking for jobs now, since this is the most important part.

"Start now," he said. "Get the experience of rejection. Do whatever it takes (to get hired). If it doesn't work try something else."

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himself. "The greatest thing in the world is to be serious about things that are funny and vice versa," he said.

University of Southern California. He was editor of his student newspaper and a humor magazine. He lived

in Paris from 1952-1968 and was a columnist for the *Herald Tribune* for 14 years. His column is syndicated out

of the *Los Angeles Times* by 550 papers. In 1982 he won the Pulitzer Prize for one of his commentaries.

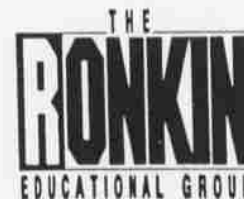


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
