Rebels' zone stifles UC Irvine

Home court win streak now at 42

The UNLV basketball team is often thought of as a high-flying, high-scoring, fast-break team. The name Runnin' Rebels conjures up visions of slam dunks and 100-point games.

But last night the Rebels, 71-52 winners over UC Irvine, showed another aspect that has always been a trademark of Jerry Tarkanian-coached teams-a stifling defense.

They got (only) six points after we went to the zone," Tarkanian said. "They got two field goals after we went zone and one was on a deflected pass."

During a 9:45 stretch of the first half, UNLV, playing their 2-3 zone defense, outscored the Anteaters 16-0.

Tarkanian was pleased with his teams first-half performance.

"I couldn't be any happier with the firsthalf," Tarkanian said. "They really, truly didn't get any shots off. It wasn't that they were missing, they really didn't get any shots."

UC Irvine made just four of their 23 shots from the field in the first half, an abysmal 17 percent. The Anteaters scored just six points after the Rebels went to the zone with about 16 minutes left and trailed 35-12 at the half.

Guard Dexter Boney credited the zone with the Rebels' success.

"With the zone we get a lot of teams Mexico State.

rattled," Boney said. "We were playing hard-that's the key. It's more fun when you're playing hard."

In the second half, the Rebels experimented some defensively.

"Our man (to-man defense) is coming but it's not great," Boney said. "Our zone is better."

Boney said the team was inspired after Tarkanian got on them for their lackluster performance at San Jose State.

"We've been playing pretty goodexcept San Jose State," Boney said. "We didn't want to hear it again from him (Tark)."

The Anteaters were able to keep the margin from getting any bigger in the second half despite shooting just 34 percent from the field for the game.

Ten different Rebels scored, led by J.R. Rider's 25 (17 in the second half).

UNLV's 7-foot center Elmore Spencer played just 13 minutes. Tarkanian said Spencer had difficulty breathing and tired fast.

UNLV reentered the Associated Press Top 25 at No. 25 this week. The Rebels, who spent all of last season at No. 1 in both polls (they can't receive any votes in the CNN/USA Today coaches poll this season because of their probation), fell out of the poll after their loss to Rutgers in December.

The Rebels, now 15-2, ran their win streak to 12. They host Fresno State at the Thomas & Mack Thursday at 8:05 p.m. before traveling to Las Cruces, N.M., Saturday to play once-beaten New
