A reception will be held Monday, to acquaint students with the Women's Center, said Mary Ruth Carlton, director of the center.

The reception will take place from 3 to 5 p.m. in the Donald C. Moyer Student Union's Fireside Lounge. Eventually, the center will be part of a future student services complex, funded by a Donrey Foundation grant.

Carlton, who is also a communications instructor, said she wants everyone on campus to know "the center is here."

"There are a lot of universities that have had a women's center for 20 years, so we're a little behind," she said. A previous attempt to start one at UNLV didn't work out.

UNLV's center will be ahead of others, however, because it will have its own building. "We're going to have one

especially tailored to be a women's center," she said.

Carlton stressed it's more important than ever for campus women to have a center. "I really think this time has more pressure," she said. "We're in hard economic times. Anything that helps them ahead is beneficial."

Single mothers or displaced homemakers who attend college have special problems Carlton said. A center can really help them.

Men can also take advantage of the center, because many seminars and workshops will be geared towards both sexes. "It's there to see that people get over the barriers and get an education," Carlton said.

Carlton said she would like to see Rush director and film producer Lili Zanuck, Gloria Steinem and National Public Radio reporter Nina Totenberg speak on campus.
