## **Senate President** needs to take action

His "sweep it under the rug" attitude is evident in his non-action concerning the controversy surrounding Student Government.

Four student government representatives — Vice President Kevin Briggs, former Director Mike Quick, Sen. Scott Fisher and Sen. Jami Nalder — "borrowed" student money and waited seven weeks to pay it back, interest free. It is alleged that these representatives cashed in on a hotel room while attending a Student Services national convention, took the money and goofed around at Disney World. Quick has admitted to driving the rental car across state lines into Georgia to visit friends.

Nalder admitted to knowing that Quick, who was at that time director of student services, had dropped his classes in mid-October.

Two senators, one of whom is Fisher, have filed charges against Nalder for not coming forward with this information about Quick. These same two senators are members of the Rules Committee, which will review these charges.

Kennedy advised all four involved in the scandal that the last senate meeting was open and anything they said could and would be used against them in the student newspaper. He encouraged the senators to call for a closed session.

At Wednesday's Rules Committee meeting, he told the senators to define their charges in writing to avoid press coverage.

He did not hold a senate meeting because he said there was not enough business. He also implied he was waiting for someone to request a closed session.

In other words, by Kennedy's way of thinking, if the press and constituents are present at a meeting, better to be silent or secretive than to reveal the truth.

He has not yet ordered an investigation of the two senators involved (with the convention) because Kennedy claims no one has filed any charges. He said he couldn't take the initiative himself because he did not know what laws these senators had violated. However, our senate president had a full week to find

"I don't want to jump into something and do something wrong," he said.

Like a true politician, Kennedy wants to satisfy all of the people all of the time and prefers to wait until the students cause an uproar due to bad legislation.

When the Student Advisory Committee met with the administration to discuss budget cuts, Kennedy abstained from voting. How, then, did he represent us, the students? He also has the power to appoint temporary senators to the Rules Committee to review pending cases involving dramatic conflicts of interest but has
