Bradys booed off Ham stage

Former Reagan press secretary shouted down by gun advocates

On March 30, 1981, former White House Press Secretary James Brady was shot in an attempt to protect President Ronald Reagan from John Hinckley's bullets. Friday, Brady and his wife Sarah, were again shot down in an attempt to educate university students. This time, however, the bullets were words and they were delivered by the more than 200 anti-gun control activists who attended their speech on cam-

The Bradys declared the "mob" one of the worst they had ever encountered. The crowd heckled, booed and screamed at Sarah Brady. Student Government President Roderick Colebrook was forced to come on stage halfway through the

speech to calm the riled audience. The scheduled question and answer session was cancelled and University Police swarmed the area.

Before and after the speech, protesters crowded in the area between Artemus W. Ham Concert Hall and Judy Bayley Theater cursing Sarah Brady and her beliefs.

At the end of his speech, Brady said that he hoped the "audience (who) turned into a mob all goes out and has a beer."

"I went there with an open mind," said Heidi Smith, a junior majoring in English who is also a member of Student Government. "I wanted to hear both sides of the issue and I would have appreciated having the opportunity to hear the Bradys who we went to a lot of trouble to bring here. I would have liked to hear the other side speak instead of acting like barbarians. If anything they swayed me to believe in gun control."

In his speech, Brady said his road to recovery has been a

"I spent seven long years in rehab," he said. "The hardest thing I've had to lose (is) independence.

Security beefed up for surprise presidential visit

UNLV had a surprise visitor Thursday when President Bush made an unforeseen visit to campus to do some jogging. The president, accompanied by Governor Bob Miller, UNLV President Robert Maxson, Athletic Director Jim Weaver and some UNLV student-athletes,

made several laps of the field, waving to curious onlookers as he passed by.

Word of the visit spread early in the day and campus police, spaced out thinly along the wire fence around the track, were kept busy warning people away. As the motorcade drew closer to the field, UNLV police were joined by an inner cordon of secret service agents, who sternly kept watch through
