

Golf team swings to victory

The UNLV golf team squeaked out a two-stroke win over Oklahoma State to win the Taylor Made/Hawaii-Hilo Invitational, 902 to 904. The University of Texas placed third while Arkansas and Texas Christian University placed fourth and fifth.

The Rebels were led by defending NCAA National Champion Warren Schutte,

who tied for second with a score of 222 on Saturday just two strokes back of Alan Bratton of OSU at 220.

Monte Montgomery was sixth, shooting 224, while Edward Fryatt placed two strokes back in seventh place. Rebels Eric Schroeder and Darin Osborne came in 33rd and 44th in the three-day event.

And if that was not enough to keep people interested in the contest there were two banner waving incidents which kept the crowd in the game. Twice during the contest overzealous fans carried a sign around the arena which read "Fire Maxson." Just for the record, the banner drew a good round of applause.

The score at halftime was 50-13, and at one time the Rebels led 70-17.

Motivation for this blowout can possibly be traced to a report in the *Las Vegas Review-Journal* Thursday accusing some former Rebel players from last year's Final Four team of possibly being involved in some type of point-shaving scandal. This report so moved the coach that he gathered his team together before the contest and had an emotional talk with them.

The Tigers limited Rebel junior guard J.R. Rider, who had averaged 21 points in the Big West and was named conference Player of the Week, to only a mere four first-half points and 10 overall.

The Rebels' were led by senior center, Elmore Spencer, who scored 15 points, pulled down a season-high 15 rebounds, and had four assists.

Junior forward Gray and guard Dexter Boney both added 14 points in the triumph. Pacific's guard Tony Amundsen led the Tigers with 21 points.

The win kept UNLV undefeated in conference play in 14 attempts and posted a 22-2 overall record. The Tigers, meanwhile, will go back to Stockton with a 4-8 Big West record and 8-13 overall.
