As enrollment at UNLV increases, more parentsturned-students are in need of on-campus care for their children.

Many students have relied on the UNLV-CSUN College of Education Pre-school to tend their kids. This center has always benefited students who attend day classes but there has always been an unfilled. need for child care during evening classes.

Until this semester, students in search of a night care facility on campus have been out of luck. Fortunately, the day care center, formerly opened from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m., has extended its hours until 7 p.m.

According to Michele Lansing, director of the child care program, evening care is in high demand. Although the extended hours exist only on a trial basis, Lansing said the need for evening child care will probably increase as enrollment in evening classes increases.

Located in the William D. Carlson Education Building, the child care center offers a variety of programs, from a fully equipped playground to a functioning preschool. Children between the ages of 2 1/2 and six are eligible for enrollment but may be put on a waiting list.

When asked what lies ahead for the center, Lansing said that a lot depends on space allocation." With 100 children already involved in the program, the capacity for growth is limited.

"The preschool hours (9 to 11:30 a.m.) are the most desired times, making it the most crowded," Lansing said.

"Tuesdays and Thursdays are heavy nights," she said for those parents who are seeking night care.

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
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"During remodeling we didn't spend money to fix it," he said.
