

Student gives back to community

The first time UNLV students, Clark County elementary schools and Goodwill Industries worked together in feeding needy families was during the last holiday season.

As a junior communication studies major employed by Nevada Advertising, 29-year-old Marc Sperberg helped to coordinate Goodwill's '91 food drive by using his experience gained as promotion director at KRLV radio 106.5.

Due to his efforts, Sperberg is now a member of the board of directors at Goodwill Industries.

"This is interesting when you consider that I'm still a student," he said. He added most people on the board, such as attorney Jan Paul Koch, are established in the business community.

In addition to holding a position directly below the

chair, Sperberg is also chair for the public relations committee for Goodwill.

As promotion director at KRLV, Sperberg's job is to evaluate all charitable organizations and to decide which ones the radio station would be most comfortable in representing.

"(Goodwill) remembered the good ideas I had had as director and asked me if I'd help them out again," Sperberg said.

Sperberg said he has the highest regard for Goodwill Industries in his experience in working with charitable organizations.

"Their dedication is just unbelievable," he said.

Eighteen elementary schools raised 12,000 pounds of food which more than compensated for Goodwill's depleted resources last winter. The school that raised the most food won a Hewlett Packard laser printer. There were also first-, second- and third-place trophies.

"It was a huge success. We gave the schools information packets so that they knew exactly what to do," said Sperberg.

Other UNLV students who helped Sperberg with the drive are Deanne Hill, Marilyn Ming, Allison Schreiber and Gwendolyn Watson.

As a board member of Goodwill, Sperberg wants to promote UNLV student involvement in assisting charity drives.

"Any student can get hands-on experience as a volunteer, and it's great to put on a resume," he said. "I want to establish business relationships so that we can have a year-round system. Being heavily involved with the university has done nothing but help."

Student selected for physics program at Los Alamos

William Clark, a student at UNLV, has been selected as one of 20 students nationwide to participate in the Los Alamos Summer School in Atomic, Molecular and Optical Physics this summer in New Mexico.

Clark, a senior majoring in physics, also will receive a summer science fellowship for the program that will cover tuition, living and travel expenses.

The program will take place June 8 through July 31 on the campus of the University of New Mexico, Los Alamos.

At UNLV, Clark, 22, has participated in the laser physics program. He has also performed calculations on the supercomputer under the guidance of professor Bernard Zygelman.
