Hustlin' Rebels lose two of three in weekend series

Diaz continues hitting streak

The UNLV Hustlin' Rebel baseball team began a threegame series against 10thranked Long Beach State on a sour note by dropping the first two games of the series. Costly errors along with too many runners being left on base have plagued the Rebels in the first two games.

In the first game, pitcher Jonathan Jarolimek suffered his first loss of the season allowing 10 runs on 11 hits and walking five in six innings of work. Only seven runs were earned against Jarolimek as his ERA jumped to 2.94 and his record fell to 6-1.

"I just didn't have it today," Jarolimek said. "My control just wasn't there and I fell behind in the count too often."

The key point in the game came in the fourth inning with UNLV leading 2-1. A throwing error by shortstop Steve Biermann with two outs kept the inning alive and Long Beach State designated hitter Todd Pridy capitalized on the opportunity by hitting a grand slam over the right center field fence. That gave Long Beach State a 5-2 lead and they coasted to an 11-5 victory. Mike Hubel led the Rebels with three hits. Lee

Reiber and Demond Thompkins each had two hits to lead the Rebel attack.

Saturday's game went much like Friday's, with Long Beach State winning 8-4. T.J. Mathews, who was coming off two impressive outings, gave up 10 hits and eight runs in five-plus innings of work. Only three runs were earned as the Rebels continued to make costly errors on defense.

Like Friday, one key play changed the whole complexion of the game, and like Friday Long Beach State capitalized with a grand-slam home run. With two outs in the sixth inning second baseman John Coats made a fielding error to load the bases. The next batter for Long Beach State, Jason Giambi hit a grand-slam home run off Mathews on an 0-2 count and gave the 49ers an 8-2 lead. Giambi also had a two-run home run in the first to give Long Beach State the 8-4 victory.

Lino Diaz kept his 15-game hitting streak alive in a big way by banging out three hits. Tory Miran, Coats and Biermann each had two hits to lead the way for the Rebels. However the Rebels stranded 10 base runners failing to receive time-

On Sunday, the Hustlin' Rebels out-muscled Long Beach State to salvage the third game of the series at Barnson Field.

Nick Kuster and Dan Madsen each clubbed home runs to give UNLV the 5-3 victory. The Rebels are now 20-12 on the

Tory Miran went nine strong innings for his sixth victory of the season. Miran allowed three runs on seven hits with only two runs being

"I felt that our team needed a big victory today to keep some confidence in themselves," Miran said. "Being a senior, I felt that I needed to give the best effort that I could. My arm felt good and I was spotting my pitches well."

Diaz led the attack with three hits to run his hitting streak to 16 games.

"I started out in a terrible slump this season," Diaz said. "But now I'm seeing the ball real well and gaining confidence at bat."

UNLV started slow and found themselves down 2-0 in the third. Madsen quickly changed that with a line drive shot of the scoreboard to cut Long Beach States lead in half.

"It felt great," Madsen said. "I've been struggling a little bit with the bat and have changed a few things with my swing. Today I felt good at the plate

and my adjustments paid off for me today."

Kuster then stepped up with a man on and hit a towering home run right down the right field line and right over the foul pole to give UNLV a 3-2 lead. Diaz singled home Demond Thompkins in the fifth and that was all Miran needed for the
