Diaz lets his playing do the talking

When people first meet junior Lino Diaz they might not understand him. It's not that he has any obscure political views or is outspoken in his beliefs, he just doesn't speak very good English.

Diaz, an infielder, currently has a 16-game hitting streak for the UNLV Hustlin' Rebel baseball team, and is hitting .345.

"When I came to America
the hardest thing was overcoming the language barrier,"
Diaz said with a strong Panamanian accent. "I moved to the
United States four years ago
and that is when I first began to
learn English."

Diazwent to school at Saint Francis College in Lorette, Pa. before coming to UNLV. At Saint Francis, Diaz was in classes with approximately 14 other students from Central America, none whom could speak English. Diaz and the other students required year-round schooling due to the language problem.

"We never had vacation," Diaz said. "They made us go to school all year, all week long. Vacations were at a vo-tech school."

Even if the language was a problem, Diaz has had no trouble adapting to the American way of baseball. He is hitting .486 over the last nine games and .526 with men in scoring position.

Coach Fred Dallimore has high expectations for Diaz. "He is a very hard worker with a great attitude. He has been an impact player and will continue to be one for us," Dallimore said.

Dallimore also said Diaz is a "likeable kid" but Diaz wasn't sure the rest of the team always felt that way.

"You want to be in the group with the guys but sometimes you're afraid of what they say," Diaz said. "You feel something you say might not be funny and sometimes you can't be yourself. Sometimes I'm quiet when I don't want to be."

The players on the team have come to accept Diaz, and his accent becomes more of a game than an embarrassment. Senior outfielder Tory Miran hassles Diaz as much as anyone.

"The other day Lino said he was going to get 'tree men' and none of us could understand what he meant," Miran said. "Later we found out he was going to the training room to ice his arm and what he was saying was 'treatment' for his arm."

Though the team messes with Diaz all the time, none of them can deny some of the feats he has accomplished.

Last year Diaz was considered by Baseball Magazine the toughest hitter in Division I to strike out. Diaz only struck out five times in 176 at-bats last year. This year Diaz struck out only once.

Though Diaz hasn't mastered the English language yet, he's not having much problem with the game of baseball. And if you hear Diaz say, "T yay. Jew yerk," just try and understand that maybe T.J. deserved to be called that.
