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Skirmish allegedly erupts in dorm

Two female students were allegedly assaulted in Residential Life South Building D on Sept. 12. One received visible physical injuries—she reported her head had been slammed into a wall by one of two male sus-

"Why they got injured we don't positively know yet," said Detective Sgt. Lonnie Barrett.

Barrett said officers encountered a group of students surrounding the scene where the alleged assaults occurred. Bartwo males in the group whom they said were allegedly responsible.

When questioned, Kevin Schanda, 20, former student, and student Lee Azurin, 23, became combative and were arrested for accessory (being in the group) to battery with a deadly weapon (the wall) and obstructing a police officer.

Schanda was also arrested for battery on a police officer. No other members of the group have been arrested as of yet.

"These were incidental charges, because of their attirett said witnesses pointed out tude," Barrett said. "The two

suspects (for the alleged assault) are still outstanding. We have identified three suspects and will be interviewing them. Charges are pending."

Liz Baldizan, assistant to the vice president for Student Services and special assistant for Judicial Affairs, is also investigating the case. However, Baldizan said her main concern is with the female students.

Residential Life Director Terry Piper said he is also conducting an investigation but refused to comment further.

Russell went after the Democrat presidential candidate by pointing out that Bill Clinton's problem wasn't sending troops into combat, just going there

Even the non-candidate Ross Perot was the target of Russell's wit.

Russell said the reason people had put such blind faith in Perot was "because Jim and Tammy Baker are out of work."

Russell ended the show by taking a poll, asking the audience if the election were held tomorrow who they would vote for. The applause was overwhelmingly in Clinton's favor.


