And then they played their ballads, which rocked just as viably as their harder cuts, showing sincere talent.


No longer able to put off the die-hards, Tora Tora relunctantly gave up their first MTV hit, "Walkin' Shoes."


Pandemonium!

Ending their only encore, Tora Tora literally gave the crowd "One for the Road" from their '89 release "Surprise Attack."


Undeniably, these boys jammed.
