As the dust settles on the first full weekend of conference soccer play, one thing is certain: the Pacific Division of the MPSF is still up for grabs.

The solid Matador defense is anchored by jurior goalkeeper Louie Mata (1.08 goal-against average).

The Rebels are favored Sunday against the rebuilding UC Santa Barbara Gauchos (2-8-0, Friday's matchup is crucial. 0-3-0), who are in the midst of a

four-game losing-streak. They're led by midfielders Patrick Griffin and Kendall Fargo and defender Stefan Gudmundsson.

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Schell remains dutifully cautious in his assessment of this weekend's opponents.

"They (the Matadors and the Gauchos) never let up," he said. "They don't quit coming."

To win, Schell says, UNLV will have to "play the game for 90 minutes," which has been their problem all year.

If UNLV wins their remain-

ing conference games, they can do no worse than tie for first place, which will send them to the MPSF tournament. Easier said than done, considering their toughest games remain against first place Cal-State Fullerton and New Mexico, which recently upset powerhouse UCLA.

"We haven't peaked yet," says Schell. "When we do, things are going to start rolling.
