According to Maxson, Booke said "I would advise for you giving consideration to resigning or

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"I told Tark that evening that I would not let Perry be hung around the neck of UNLV." Maxson said. "I knew that we were at another level. I knew we were at a point where it could destroy any academic reputation that we had built up. I said I was prepared to do anything I had to do to protect the university."

Maxson said after that he received at least five different calls from regent Joseph Foley, Sig Rogich, and various attorneys discussing the terms of Tarkanian's resignation.

Maxson did not expect the storm of publicity that followed.

"I thought that it would be a victory lap. I thought that it would end with a victory parade down Freemont Street," he said.

Later that week, claimed Maxson, there began an orchestrated attempt to discredit anyone who wasn't on the side of the basketball program and to damage the academic reputation of the university.



Regent Shelley Berkley said she is definitely in favor of approving new programs for UNLV.

"I am in favor of approving these programs first then finding the money. Most say find the funding first, then approve them."
