The Rebels lost to San Diego State 3-1 on Friday and to Cal State Fullerton on Sunday 9-0. The defeat at Fullerton was the worst in UNLV history.

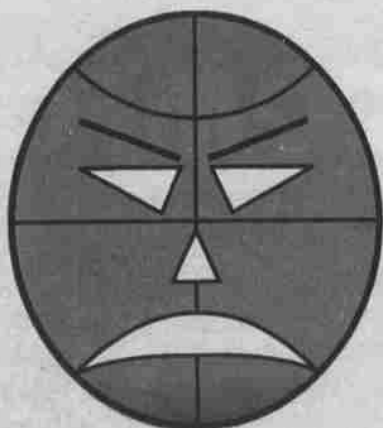
Scott Uderitz scored UNLV's only goal of the weekend off a corner kick in the second half of the San Diego State game.

Hawaii devours Rebels, 55-25

Here's a riddle: What does a Polynesian pig and the UNLV Rebels have in common?

Both get roasted and devoured in Hawaii.

The Rainbows (5-1) waxed UNLV Saturday, 55-25, in front of 38,918 onlookers at Honolulu's Aloha Stadium.

After winning three of their first four games, UNLV has dropped to 3-4 overall. The Rebels have lost three straight and have been out-scored by their opposition 109-45.

The Hawaiian offensive machine, led by quarterback Michael Carter, created more damage on the field than Hurricane Iniki.

With their triple-option offense, Hawaii out-gained the Rebels on the ground with 299 yards to the Rebels' dismal 60. Rainbow fullback Travis Sims, who had

averaged 6.5 yards per carry in his previous five games, led the attack with 83 yards on 13 carries and one touchdown.

Hawaii totaled 642 yards on offense to UNLV's 380. The quarterback trio of Michael Carter, Ivin Jasper, and Rodney Glover threw a combined five touchdown passes in the debacle.

Rebel quarterback John Ma'ae completed only 20 of his 47 passes. Ma'ae connected with pass catcher Demond Thompkins for two touchdowns in the fourth quarter. Backup quarterback Bob Stockham, who completed only 2 of his 7 passes for 38 yards, threw a touchdown strike to wide receiver Daemon Keener. The Rainbow defense intercepted Stockham 2 times.

UNLV running back Shannon McLean ran for just 11 yards on 12 carries. The sophomore rusher also had a one-yard touchdown run in the third quarter.

Sports Media Relations director decides to stay

The squabble that led to Hawk's resignation began when he and Strong disagreed about who would serve as guest host Sunday on the "Jim Strong Show" on KVBC Channel 3. Strong needed a replacement for the episode because the football team would not arrive back from Hawaii until late Sunday.

Hawk told the *Las Vegas Sun*, "It was for personal reasons. It was time for me to get on to something else."

Former UNLV quarterback Steve Stallworth served as Strong's substitute Sunday with KVBC sports anchor Colin Cowherd.

Hawk, a UNLV alumnus, has been the director of sports information since August 1990. The 1978 graduate worked at the *Las Vegas Review-Journal*.
