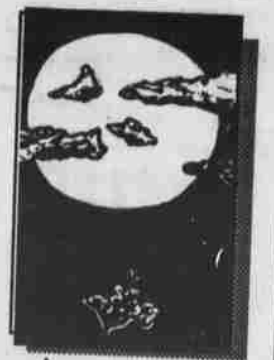

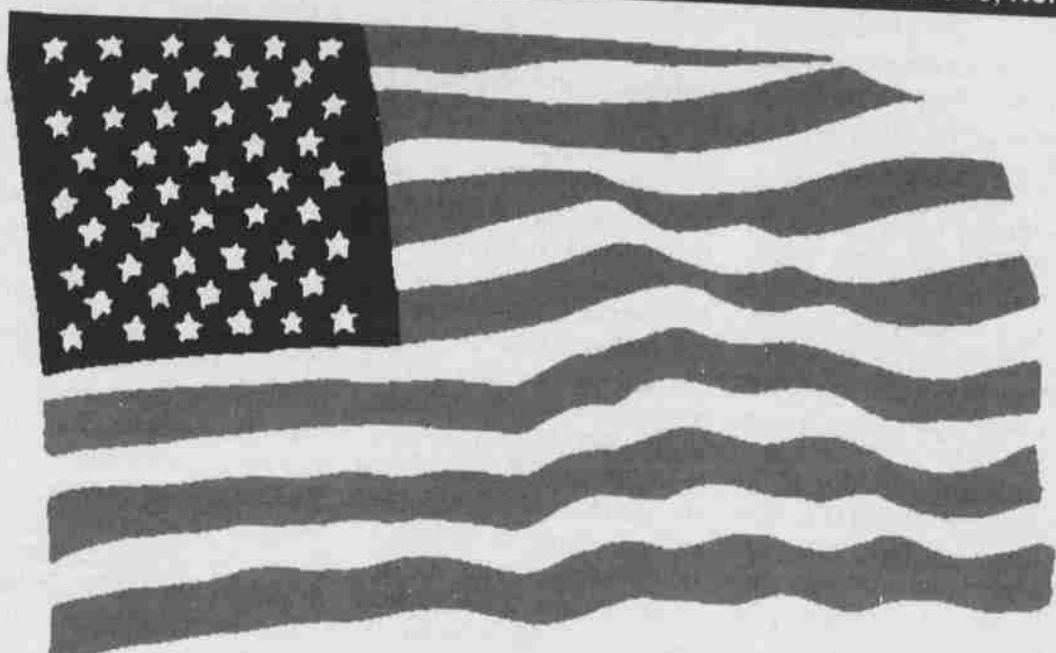

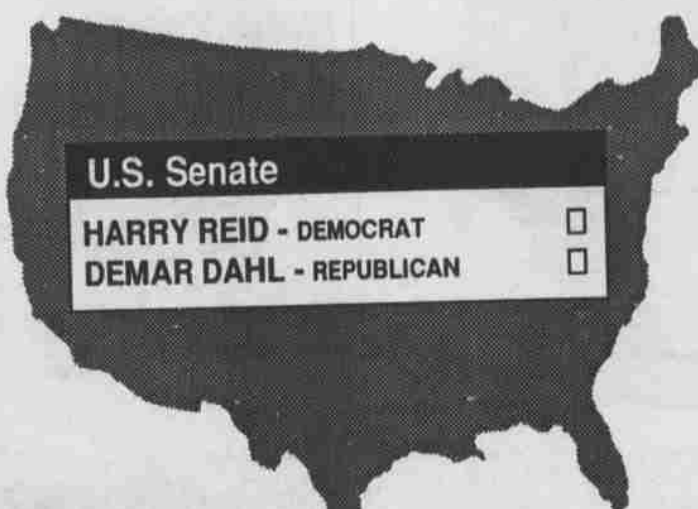
but be concerned about his plans, or lack thereof, to improve the economy.

Reid seeks second term

Democratic senator Harry Reid will face Republican challenger Demar Dahl as he seeks election to the U.S. Senate for a second term next week.

Reid, a 52-year-old politician from Searchlight, Nev., began his political career in 1966 when he was elected as a member of the Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital Board of Trustees. At the age of 30, Reid became the youngest lieutenant governor in Nevada history.

Reid has been a key player in advancing legislation through government. He was the author of the "Taxpayer Bill of Rights," a piece of legislation which protects American taxpayers from IRS abuses.

Reid pushed the Nevada Wilderness Protection Act through Congress in 1988. This act preserved 733,400 acres of wilderness to future generations of Nevadans.

He supported the Act of Better Child Care in 1989 which has made day care more available and

Dahl in first political race

The U.S. Senate could have a new face in the crowd if Republican Demar Dahl is elected on Nov. 3. Although the 49-year-old rancher faces tough competition from Democrat Harry Reid, he says he has the strength needed to make a change in Washington.

According to George Harris, Dahl's campaign manager, Dahl strongly supports the following issues:

- Term limits of 12 years for Congress, which will prevent congressional service from becoming a career.

- A line item veto, which will allow the president to cut pork barrel spending and pass good legislation.

- Passing a balanced budget amendment.
- The elimination of political action committees, of which Dahl will not accept money from.

"I heard him speak and felt a connection as far as our political philosophies," said Eric Fenster, Dahl's assistant campaign director and

Senate race a classic battle

Nevadan voters face a classic anti-incumbent dilemma Tuesday in the race for U.S. Senate between Republican challenger Demar Dahl and one-term Democratic incumbent Harry Reid.

Reid is the classic incumbent and career politician stereotype. He has served a total of 10 years in Washington—two terms in the House of Represent-

tatives and one term in the Senate. He was a Nevada State Assemblyman from 1969-71 and Lieutenant Governor.

Dahl can be classified as an anti-incumbent, non-politician. He has never held or run for political office before. It would be difficult to imagine a better anti-incumbent candidate than a cattle rancher from the middle of Nevada.
