

Students favor Clinton

Students overwhelmingly think Governor Bill Clinton will be the winner in today's election according to an informal poll taken by The Rebel Yell yesterday

Clinton holds lead

Out of 442 people asked to predict who they think will win the election, 66 percent said they thought Clinton would win, 23 percent thought President George Bush would win, 6 percent could not decide and only 5 percent thought Perot would be the next president.

The figures show a discrepancy between the candidate people said they would vote for and the candidate they thought would win.

Of 442 people who said they were going to vote, 123 said they would vote for Bush. However, only 100 predicted Bush would win. A total of 541 people were polled.

Although 204 people said they would vote for Clinton, 293 people predicted he would be the winner.

Perot was the person least picked to win the election. Only 27 people said he would win the race and 21 of those people were going to vote for him.

Choice event passes amid controversy

The abortion issue has reached Student Government with members of Student Government arguing over whether Students for Choice should receive student funding.

Wendy Finmark, CSUN Appropriations Board director, reported to the Student Senate that the board recommended the Organizations Board to reject funding for a Students for Choice function.

Students for Choice is UNLV's chapter of a national pro-choice organization. The Organizations Board overturned the Appropriation Board's findings and approved funding for the event. The Student Senate agreed with the Organizations Board and passed the request for \$150 for the function.

The issue was first raised at a Senate meeting two weeks ago. Finmark, in her statement of the board's position, said several members of the Appropriations Board were opposed to the funding.

"They said that we shouldn't be do-

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only who people thought would win, but who they were going to vote for. If UNLV students were the only voters, Clinton would become America's next president.

Yesterday's poll, as well as one taken last week, showed that students will turn out to the polls in high numbers this year.

In yesterday's poll, only 18 percent of the 541 respondents said they weren't voting and of the 442 people who said they were, 46 percent said they would vote for the governor from Arkansas.

In the poll taken last week, 77 percent of 1,106 students said they would vote and 43 percent of those said they would vote for Clinton.

Kent Nall, a 33-year-old graduate student, agreed with the results of the polls

"Twelve years of Republican administration has been a failure," he said. "I disagree with their social policies, their economic policies and foreign policies."

Nall was not alone in his assessment. Christine Butler, a 20-year-old English major, felt the same, although she was not very enthusiastic about her choice. "He's the best of a bad lot. Perot and Bush will cut education which is a very bad," she said.

Butler's ambivalence was mirrored by other students. Joe Brown, a 22-year- Thomas Moore

old business management major was not thrilled with his choices.

"I didn't like Clinton," Brown said. "He's an idiot. Bush is all right. If Clinton got in, he would mess everything up."

Sheila, a 19-year-old communication studies major, was left unmoved by the candidates. "I feel he (Bush) is the least of three evils. I don't feel Perot or Clinton will be able to bring about the changes that they say. Bush hasn't done such a bad job."

The first poll was taken last week by Valley High School students doing a project for their problems and statistics class. They asked the same question and had similar results.

 Clinton was picked 43 percent of the time.

 Bush was picked 29 percent of the time.

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
