And, with America hosting the World Cup in 1994, there is still a chance the sport will finally catch on.

"There are some leagues for me in the United States," Barber said. "You get paid but it's not big bucks. Hopefully within a couple of years they'll be full blown and have some good backers—people that put the money in needed to get it going.

"I think (U.S. soccer) can go nowhere but up. The players are getting better at younger ages, which will only enhance the soccer play in the United States."

young player lacked in experience, he made up for in effort. "He's active. The guys have a lot of confidence in him(Bennett)," Bristow said.

But Charlotte failed to dominate the perimeter, despite a knee injury that kept Portland's all-star guard Clyde Drexleron the sidelines all game. Kendall Gill was the only prominent contributor outside for the Hornets, hitting 9 of 15 and totaling 26 points.

The real success came from inside where the Hornets were expected to match up against longtime NBA veterans like Kevin Duckworth, Jerome Kersey and Buck Williams. While Charlotte lost the rebound battle 66-61, they won the shootout, hitting 52 percent of field goal attempts to the Blazers 44 percent. Portland fell behind early and was forced to play catch-up for the rest of the game.

"Portland is one of those banging type teams with the big front line," Johnson said. "Kenny (Gill) and J.R.(Reid) and myselfreally stood up and outplayed those guys down the stretch."

Perhaps Charlotte's biggest setback on the night was the ejection of Bristow. The second year coach was slapped with two technical fouls in a row after getting in a shouting match with Referee Bernie Fryer. Bristow led all coaches last year with 15 technicals.

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"I was out a little bit too far on the court and we started exchanging a few words," Bristow said. "That's the way it goes in the NBA. Can't say too much, can't do too much."

The Hornets aren't in danger of doing too much with their defense, however. Last season, only the Golden State Warriors allowed more points. For Charlotte to become competitive, they'll need better defense to go along with their running offense.

"We have guys that can put the ball in the hole," Johnson said. "Now we've got to have guys who can trap when it comes to crunch time to keep the other guys from scoring."

Charlotte opens its regular season slate next Friday when they host the Washington Bullets.
