#### Rebels hold edge on **Big Sky foes**

The UNLV football team (4-5 overall, 2-3 in the Big West) will defend their undefeated streak against Big Sky opponents this Saturday against the Montana State Bobcats at Sam Boyd's Silver Bowl at 1 p.m.

In week two, the Rebels trounced the Big Sky's Northern Arizona Lumberjacks 40-7 at home.

The Rebels have always been tough on Division I-AA foes. Most importantly, UNLV possesses a 29-17 lifetime record against Big Sky opponents. The Rebels also have won five out of six games against teams from the Treasure State (4-1 vs. Montana, 1-0 vs. Montana State).

Offensively, in the last two games, rookie running back Omar Love has gained 267 yards on 40 carries. Love, last year's Parade Magazine All-America candidate, scored two touchdowns during that period.

Rebel running back Henry Bailey has amassed an impressive 1,516 all-purpose yards this season. Bailey needs 353 yards to break the all-purpose school mark of 1,868 which was set by Mike Thomas in 1973.

Saturday's game will mark the first time Coach Jim Strong has faced the Bobcats.

The Lady Rebels' exhibition record is 1-2 over the last two seasons. UNLV defeated the Spanish National team 80-48 in 1989, lost to TSV Bayer Leverkusen 76-72 in 1990, and lost to Cuba 99-64 last season.

# **Bobcats road woes may** continue with Rebels

After losing to Utah State 48-8 two weeks ago, ending their chances for a Big West title, the UNLV football team will attempt to vent their frustrations out on the Montana State Bobcats.

The teams will kick off 1 p.m. Saturday at Sam Boyd's Silver Bowl in a non-conference match-up. The Bobcats are members of the Big Sky Conference.

The only previous meeting between these teams dates back to Nov. 14, 1970, when the Rebels edged the Bobcats 38-36 at the Silver Bowl.

Montana State has been plagued by injuries, despite a bye week before last Saturday's game against the Idaho Vandals. The offensive line suffer due to injuries to Cory Brye, Martin Nava, Tim Hanson, and Bucky Haynes.

The Bobcats (4-6 overall, 2-4 in conference) has been outscored this year 137-64 on the road and are winless away from Sales Stadium, their home field. In Montana State's last outing,



the Bobcats lost to Idaho 28-7.

Last Saturday Montana State became the first team to hold the Vandals to less than 400 yards this season (399), while freshman quarterback Chad Meyer had his best day as a Bobcat completing 20 of 33 passes for 206 yards and a touchdown.

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Wide Receiver Rob Tesch amassed a total of 108 all-purpose yards and also broke Montana State's career receiving record.
