Suspects in Helldorado SWE event plead guilty

Three men involved in an affray with University Police at Helldorado Days last spring plead guilty Monday.

Charles and Kenny Splond and Otis Dupree were fined \$500 each

The Splonds were charged with various criminal acts that stemmed from a stolen bag of ice.

"We (university police) were in a tresspass mode for Helldorado. In other words we were not out to make arrests," Barrett said. "If people were causing trouble we would simply make sure they were escorted out of the carnival."

While the Splonds were being arrested a person with a video camera taped the event. Much attention was given by the local media because it was relatively close to the time of the Rodney King beating.

The action in question was University Police officer James

Avery spraying cap-stun into the eyes of a handcuffed Splond.

"What is not shown in the video is that Kenny was wearing very heavy boots and kicked Officer Avery, spraining his left arm," Barrett said. "He sprayed the cap-stun to get him under control."

The spraying of the cap-stun became a major issue of using excessive force.

"We never tried to hide what Officer Avery did," Barrett said. "He was injured and Kenny was yelling to the crowd for people to 'kick his (Officer Avery's) mother f-ing ass.

Sensitivity training was provided for University Police to ensure the same mistake would not be made in the future.

"I think (their guily pleas) say a lot," Barrett said. "They would not have plead guilty if they were not guilty."

The defendants were each given the option of performing 100 hours of community service in lieu of paying the fines.
