Women hoopsters slip by NMSU

The Lady Rebels overcame an 18-point Roadrunner lead and increased its win streak to 16 Saturday against NMSU.

New Mexico State made the Lady Rebels look like Wile E. Coyote Saturday night. The Roadrunners simply out-hustled, out-ran, and out-played its conference nemesis.

But UNLV (18-1 overall, 12-0 in the Big West) sliced into the Roadrunner lead when guard Cherie Hogg dropped the "ACME bomb" on New Mexico State (12-9, 8-6) to start a decisive, 13-0 second-half run.

The guard nailed a three-point basket to spark the Lady Rebel charge with 2:52 left in the game.

Forward Teresa Jackson nailed two crucial free throws with 0:07 seconds remaining in regulation to secure the victory over the reeling Roadrunners 67-63 in front of 725 crazed, Rebel fanatics in the South Gym.

"Cherie did a great job," said head coach Jim Bolla of the Rebel guard. The 5-foot-7 junior from Canberra, Australia, led UNLV

with 24 points, including the first 12 tallies in the second half.

"I knew this would be a tough game," said Bolla. The Roadrunners' hot hands, freshman forward Anita Maxwell and teammate Alisha Cole mounted an early 18-8 run in the second half for a 55-38 New Mexico State lead.

"We had the ability to come back from that big (Roadrunner) lead," said Bolla.

After Hogg nailed two jump-shots to start the late Rebel run, sophomore Gwynn Hobbs swiped a New Mexico State miscue for an easy lay-up.

"The key was the final six minutes in the second half," said Bolla. In that stretch, the Rebels tallied 14 points en route to its 16th consecutive victory.

"Those (Roadrunner) turnovers were a great rally point for us," Bolla said.

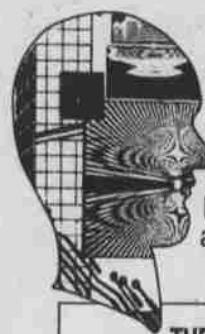
The Lady Rebels capitalized on 23 New Mexico State mistakes in the final minutes of the game.

Jackson finished the evening with 18 points and 8 rebounds. Three-point extraordinaire Hobbs scored 10 with a couple of baskets from long range.

New Mexico State was led by Maxwell with 22 tallies. Fellow Roadrunner Cole converted five of 10 three-pointers for 15 points.

The Rebels survived a first-half scare, as forward Trudie Hopgood sustained an ankle injury. Hopgood returned for action later in the game.

UNLV plays tonight at 7:30 in a non-conference match against Southern Utah at the South Gym.
