Controversy with new drug may be based in ignorance

RU486, the new drug in birth control devices for women, has made its wave in the United States. Surrounded by controversy as the "abortion pill," there are more uses for it than simply as a means for abortion.

This "abortion pill" is not actually one pill taken the morning after unprotected sex. Rather it is three different pills and one injection administered in a doctor's office. The three pills each contain 200 milligrams of mifepristone. Two days later an injection or vaginal suppository of

prostaglandin is made. One week later, a third visit is made to the doctor's office where the woman is checked to make sure the abortion has been completed. This procedure can be done up to nine weeks after a missed menstrual cycle with an effective rate of 96 percent.

RU486 is an alternative to clinic, or vacuum aspiration, abortions. This fertility-control drug was developed in France by the French Pharmaceutical firm, Roussel Uclaf. When taken in conjunction with pros-

taglandin,

woman will effectively be able to terminate an unwanted pregnancy safely, according to a Feminist Majority Foundation Report. RU486 will stop the progesterone hormone emitted by a woman's body, halting the pregnancy. The drug prostagladin will induce contractions, which are said to feel like a strong period, thus terminating the unwanted pregnancy. RU486 is a private, noninvasive and safe drug, and is becoming a popular choice among European women.

In 1988, the French government declared RU486 "the moral property of women," and ordered Roussel to make the compound available to women

in France. Currently the "new generation" fertility-control drug has been used by over

90,000 women in 20 different countries, according to the Feminist Majority Foundation Report. This drug has other important uses. It has been proven through testing in many countries to be effective for inducing labor in difficult deliveries, which reduces the need

> Testing is done with RU486 on victims of Cushing's syndrome, a life threatening disease where the body produces too much coritsol and effects women more than men most of the time. for Caesarean sections.



In addition, RU486 is a possible treatment for breast cancer, the most common form of cancer in American women: endometriosis, one of the three leading causes of female infertility; and meninigoioma, a type of brain or spinal cord tumor which occurs twice as frequently in women than in men.

In addition to being widely accepted in Europe, testing and use of RU486 is supported by organizations such as the American Medical Association, Endometriosis Foundation, International Planned Parenthood Federation, International Women's Health Coalition, and the National Alliance of Breast Cancer Association, and many more world wide recognized organizations.

The controversy surrounding the abortion issue in the United States has focused on RU486 as an "abortion pill," as opposed to a its possible means for helping with difficult deliveries and other women's health issues. Threats of boycotts from fundamental religious groups and the conservative Reagan-Bush administration have kept the drug out of the United
