

# **'Cadillac Tramps' will cruise** through the Shark Club

Forging a sound that careens through trash-filled urban alleyways as well as it takes a drive in the country, The Cadillac Tramps have traveled a long road to reach the release of their debut album and tour. It's rock n' roll from a quintet that relives the style of the '50s while chronicling life in the '90s, and they're coming to the Shark Club tomorrow night. The bands No Doubt and Joyride will open the evening.

"People always wanna know what you're influenced by. You're influenced by everything you see and hear, y'know? (You are influenced) from the time you're five years old, or whatever, on," said guitarist Brian Coakley.

Formed in 1987 by vocalist Mike "Gabby" Gaborno and guitarist Johnny "Two Bags" Wickersham, The Cadillac Tramps are longtime participants in the Orange County punk scene that spawned groups like Social Distortion and The Adolescents. The rest



of the band is rounded out by bassist Warren Renfrow and drummer, Jamie Reidling, While the five piece might look like punk thugs, they say they're as concerned with melody as they are with power.

The five members use their varied musical backgrounds to bring forth the wild sound that marks the band. A healthy tension leads to raucous energy. "It's the type of tension," says Coakley, "you get when you hold a blues riff just the right way."

"You take somebody who's influenced by soul," Gaberno continues, "and you put him with somebody who's influenced by blues and maybe somebody else who might be influenced by jazz and then you put someone in who's completely different. By all rights, none of these musicians should blend together and form anything. But you put it all together and there's a certain chemistry."
