Pitcher Lori Harrigan gave up only seven hits in the three games she pitched. Freshman Cyndi Hewitt picked up one win while giving up two hits and Kim Smith suffered the only loss of the tournament while giving up a team high six hits.

The other pitcher of record for the Lady Rebels was Amie Stewart, who pitched in the title game against Cal State Northridge, winning 3-0. Stewart allowed only four hits to pick up her third win of the season. Stewart was backed on offense by a three-run sixth inning. The runs came after consecutive singles by Kenda Lef-

fler, Erika Swanson and two walks by Smith and Felicia Benjamins. Swanson's single scored Michele Moreno who reached base on an error. Beniamins' walk scored Leffler and Trish Spencer's fielders choice scored Swanson.

The Lady Rebels played a tripleheader on Friday, winning two of three. They lost 1-0 to the No.20 ranked Oregon Ducks; beat Southwest Louisiana and Southern Utah by the identical scores of 6-0.

Pitcher Harrigan recorded her second no-hitter of the season and the fifth of her career against Southwestern Louisiana. Erika Swanson hit her first career home run in the game against Southern Utah.

In their lone game Saturday, the Lady Rebels defeated Cal State Northridge 1-0. Harrigan threw a three-hitter and allowed no walks.

In their semi-final game against Cal Poly Pomona the Lady Rebels need extra inning to pull out a 2-1 victory. Nei-
