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Rebel Yell Students say free football parking not enough to increase attendance

Owing to an agreement reached between Student Body President Joel Kostman and Athletic Director Jim Weaver, students will now be able to park at Rebel football games free of charge with a valid parking sticker.

Based on 1992 statistics, the savings to students is an estimated \$20,000 per year.

In addition, an area has been set aside for Student Government to host tailgate parties. Kostman said other plans are being proposed, also aimed at increasing student home-game attendance.

Kostman stated there were two main objectives behind the initiative:

"No. 1, I wanted students to be free of the tax. That \$3 fee was one more tax the students had to pay. "No. 2, I thought we could draw

more students out there without charging \$3 a carload."

The move was certain to please students who attend games regularly, but is it enough to attract the casual fan who otherwise might not go?

Though students' reactions were mixed, most interviewed agreed the initiative was a good start but that it would take something extra to attract more

students. Marc Baruch, a senior, said free parking would mostly please those who already attend games, but doubted its impact on a student who is otherwise unenthusiastic about attending.

"The people who go normally go," Baruch said, "they're going to be happy, but as far as drawing more people out there (Sam Boyd Silver Bowl), I don't think it will make a difference."

Several students suggested alternative routes for attracting the student body to games. Tailgate parties, shuttle services, entertainment and theme days (like at baseball parks) were all proposed as a means of making games more attractive to casual fans or those who don't follow the sport.

"The casual fan would rather stay home and watch a game on television than having to drive all the way to the Silver Bowl and fight traffic," said Cody Cox, a freshman. "If there were a shuttle to take students to the game, that would better help at-

tendance."

A member of the Greek community on campus also had ideas on increasing student involvment. Gal Eilat of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity said he was uncertain whether or not free parking would fill seats but believes pre-game activities could.

"I hope (free parking) works, they've got to try something, Eilat said. "I think traffic will be worse though. We (Eilat's fraternity) would usually go two or three to a car (to save money).

Eilat said a larger area of the parking lot should be designated for students wishing to hold tailgate parties.

'You only have that little fenced-in area," he said. "Bring in the radio stations or maybe some different live bands.'

But of those surveyed, there was one sure-fire crowd-pleaser that nearly everyone agreed would work.

"People want to see a winning team," said Sam Smith, a junior. "If they had a winning record and maybe went to some sort of bowl, then maybe people would go see them."


