UNLV golf team wins Cougar Classic.

When an athlete is playing up to their full potential at a given time they are known to be in a "zone." UNLV's Edward Fryatt is in quite a zone.


The 6-foot-4-inch Fryatt won the individual title at last weekend's BYU Cougar Classic in Provo, Utah. It was Fryatt's second strong showing in a row. He finished second overall at last week's Sun Devil Invitational, shooting a career-best 209 for three rounds.

Fryatt shot a 210 to win the Cougar Classic on a first-hole

playoff, edging out New Mexico's Tim Herron. Fryatt led throughout the tournament shooting a 67 in the opening round before finishing with a 72 and 71 in the





victory with a tremendous threeround total score of 859, four strokes ahead of BYU. UNLV even threatened to sweep the first three spots after two rounds. After the second round Fryatt led with a 139, Chris Riley was in

second at 140 and Eric Schroeder was in fourth with 142. The scarlet and silver sweep would not be realized as Riley finished fourth shooting an impressive 214. Eric Schroeder finished seventh with a 216. UNLV's ace, Schutte, tied for 32nd with a

score of 224.

The Cougar Classic victory was the Rebel team's first tournament win since last year and they continue to build momentum going into next week's Big West Conference Championships at the Spanish Trail Country Club here in Las Vegas.

The big story with the Rebel duffers over the past few weeks has been the play of Fryatt. Fryatt transferred to UNLV from BYU and seemed ready to play his old teammates on their own turf. He obviously knew the course and used it to his advantage. Fryatt has taken charge as Warren Schutte seems to have hit a slump since his appearance in the Masters. But if the past is any indication, Schutte will regain his form and once again

lead the Rebels to a Big West Championship.

The outstanding play of Fryatt has to have coach Dwaine Knight sleeping a little easier. The Rebels' problem this year has been inconsistency and the coming out of Fryatt and Riley's continued success have to make UNLV the favorite going into the conference tournament.

UNLV will try to make it backto-back conference championships this coming weekend at Spanish Trail.

If Fryatt continues his game and Schutte rebounds in time for next week, the Rebel golfers should have a new ring, a new hero in Fryatt and another Big West Championship.

Lady Rebs score two runs, win two games

UNLV sweeps doubleheader from NMSU.

For UNLV softball coach Shan McDonald, it was a pair of 1-0 victories over visiting New Mexico State on Sunday that was the cause for frustration. The seventh-year coach could only watch as each of her team's attempts to pick up a run fell short.

"That was a long game. That just wasn't very entertaining," McDonald said. "A one-nothing ballgame represents how nonproductive the whole day was."

For the visiting Roadrunners, it was a couple of near-wins that came down to a couple of close calls and close plays.

The worst of which was a runner who forgot to touch homeplate on a sacrifice-bunt play. After a long delay, during which both sides thought she was already called safe, pitcher Kim Smith lobbed the ball to catcher Kim Fritts who touched the plate, turning the sacrificed run into a double play.

The sweep may not have been pretty, but it did run the seventh-ranked Lady Rebels winning streak up to eight, keeping them in first place in the Big West Conference with only eight conference games remaining. It also gives UNLV the opportunity to deliver the Big West knockout blow directly to second-place Long Beach State next Saturday when the teams face-off at Rebel Diamond.

Said McDonald: "The fact that we did take four games from them and didn't fall back into a rut or a lull, that's a credit to us.

"It's sometimes hard when you play a team like New Mexico State. They have nothing to lose and it's difficult sometimes to really up your level of play."
