## Lady Rebel stringers end season with loss to Pacific



The Rebel men ended Friday's first round of Big West matches tied for second place. All matches in the men's

## Hustlin' Rebels salvage third game of series against UCSB

The UNLV baseball team halted a four-game losing skid with Sunday's slugfest 11-10 win over visiting UC Santa Barbara.

The Rebels had dropped four straight dating back to mid-week losses at Arizona State before falling in the first two of the weekend series against the Gauchos, 13-8 and 7-5.

The Rebels now stand at 18-22 overall, 5-10 in Big West Conference action.

Sunday, UNLV had to overcome deficits of 6-0 in the second and 7-2 an inning later.

The Rebel comeback started in the third with Rodney Mazion gaining a walk. Mazion then promptly stole second and scored on Jon Polson's single. Polson would cross home plate on a John Coats ground out.

The Gauchos added another score in the fourth to up the ante to 7-2 before the hosts answered.

Mike Hubel got things going

by legging out a double before Ryan Plughoff homered to leftfield for a two-run shot. Demond Thompkins followed suit with a double and would score on a Mazion ground out. Steve Biermann supplied yet another UNLV double and scored on a Polson single.

UNLV knotted things up at 7all in the fifth on Brian Anthony's ground out to short which plated Lino Diaz, who had walked.

The Gauchos responded and regained the lead in the sixth with a solo tally but the Rebels would grab their first lead of the afternoon in the bottom of the frame. With one out and Biermann on second courtesy of an error and subsequentstolen base, Polson was hit by a pitch. A balk moved both runners up 90 feet before Coats singled in Biermann. Both Polson and Coats would score to give UNLV a shortlived 10-8 lead.

Rebel Coach Fred Dallimore, using a two-inning per pitcher rotation, lifted Dennis DeMartini in favor of Byron Klemaske to start the seventh. Doug Smaldino greeted the Rebel reliever with a homer to left. Klemaske struggled throughout the seventh, loading the bases with two outs, but he managed to get out of it with the score tied at 10 apiece on a ground out.

The hosts scored the winning run in the ninth courtesy of three sacrifices.

Hubel singled to start things off and moved over to second on Blake Feeney's bunt. Plughoff then layed one down and Hubel moved to third. Thompkins lined out to center and Hubel tagged from third with the winning run.

Hubel paced the Rebel offense with a 3-for-3 day at the plate and Klemaske went three innings to pick up the win an improve to 5-4.

UNLV travels to upstate rival Nevada-Reno this weekend and hosts New Mexico State May 7-9 in its final homestand of the year.

any comparison, the numbers
thus far are fairly comparable
between the two. Though Parris
was probably the better slugger,



Parus has been the more timely hitter. In 41 games this season she has had eight game-winning hits—two more than Parris had in 67 games.

"She's a great player, one of the best hitters UNLV's ever had," Cyndi said of Christine. "It shows by all the record she holds."

Cyndi, however, has a few records of her own to show.

While she doesn't consider herself the long-ball hitter that Parris was, Parus has averaged more doubles in her second season and is pacing almost twice as many RBI's. In fact, with 10 games remaining in the regular season, the sophomore first baseman has already eclipsed Parris' season RBI record (35) at 37, has set a new single-game RBI record (seven) and with 58 ribbies, she is only six short of setting a new UNLV career mark.

But Parus maintains it's been easier for her than her predecessor. In particular, the new neon-yellow ball used in NCAA softball has allowed her to dramatically improve her stats.

Without the new ball she said, Parris' old mark would still stand.

"Basically, it's the change of the ball," Parus said. "If she was playing with this (neon-yellow) ball, I wouldn't have broken her record.

"The ball is good for me. For hitters, it's opened the game up a little. It pops off the bat a lot more than the white ball. There's a lot more singles because it gets through the infield more."


It's those singles that she counts on. Batting third in the line-up behind two speedsters, Parus knows putting the ball in play frequently means putting a run on the board.

Said Parus: "I think I'm more of a base-hit person. Anything in the gap, anything through the infield is good for me, depending on where the pitch is."

The new, more aggressive outlook of the team has also benefitted Parus.

"(McDonald) does a lot more hit-and-runs this year, a lot more bunt-and-runs instead of just bunts," Parus said. "She lets us swing away."
