
Rebel Report Card

The awards, which were selected by Burris and Campus Recreation Director Jeff

Wells, have been given out the past two years.

"I decided to give the awards for working above the call of duty," said Burris, who is in her third year as coordinator. "It's important to give the referees incentive other than pay.

"It also allows the officials to get recognized by their peers."

The criteria for the awards were more complex than simply having a good eye for balls and strikes.

"I took more than good officiating into consideration," Burris said. "We also considered attending meetings, adhering to the rules, and working well with students."

Lloyd, named most improved in his second year, looks favorably on the officiating awards.

"It gives the referees something to work for," he said. "It's an honor having my peers feel that I did a good job."

And with Burris planning on issuing the awards again this school year, Lloyd has something to look forward to again - MVP.

"I'll definitely work toward it," he said.
