During the '80s, computeruse became more commonplace and on-line computer services suchas America Online, Prodigy, Sprint Mail, MCI Mail, and EasyLinksprangupeverywhere.

Originally, many of these services charged a flat monthly fee. Now, instead of charging a low monthly fee, many of these services have begun to charge for their services on an hourly basis. For instance, Prodigy used to charge \$15 per month for its services. This change in pricing scheme has raised the on-line fees for some users dramatically.

The Internet, on the other hand, charges the academic and commercialinstitutionsitservices for their particular "domains," giving the perception to many users that services are free.

Recently companies have tried to use the net for commercial purposes, including blatant advertising of their products. According to The Wall Street

Journal, a San Diego firm tried using direct-marketing through the net's e-mail function. The company was promptly "flamed" by many users and potential clients for its violation of "netiquette." With more computer users having commercial intentions, the netitself is indanger of losing government support.
