## Health center provides coordinated care

The Student Health Center is dedicated to educating and protecting all UNLV students, according to Lori Winchell, director of Student Health Services.

The Health Center, said Winchell, has a mission with three different areas of focus. The first is clinical-patient care, which is done on a regular basis.

The second is education-preventative care. Peer education is a vital part of this area of the mission. Ray Rodriguez, the Health Education Coordinator, manages the Peer Education Programs.

The third area concerns the health and safety of the whole UNLV campus. Patty Avila-Porter, the Student Health Advocate, foShe deals with the immunizations and vaccines.

Issues related to sexuality are very important to the Student Health Center since these are the issues that the students seem most interested in.

In order to cater to their needs, the center provides information on sexually transmitted diseases, how to prevent them and how to deal with them if infected. The information is given through classes, peer education groups, and pamphlets available at the center.

According to Rodriguez, unplanned and unwanted pregnancies are a common problem.

'We've seen more pregnancies the first couple of weeks of school probably than we've seen at the beginning of any other semester," he said.

According to statistics gathered by the physicians, 30 to 35 percent of UNLV students are worried about their chances of contracting a venereal disease.

Of those who actually come in

for testing, 8 to 10 percent turn out last 12 months, and out of the 500 to be positive for a sexually transmitted disease. The most common is chlamydia. The next is venereal warts and HPV infection, followed by herpes.

Among the least common STD's is gonorrhea which is the most commonly reported infectious disease in the country, but it occurs much less frequently on campus than

The national statistics state that one out of every 1,000 college students is positive for

the HIV vi-

rus. However, the riskier the sexual behavior the higher the chances of being infected.

What is taught by health education coordinators is safer sex methods. According to Rodriguez, ....the only safe sex is masturbation."

One of the services provided by the student funded health center is the free HIV anti-body testing done every Thursday from 2 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Neither names nor student I.D. is necessary. Complete confidentiality is ensured and privacy is respected.

The testing is done quickly and efficiently, and the results are given one week later, along with advice on how to handle the situation if the results are positive.

According to Rodriguez, "This organization treats people like human beings. We're not going to treat you like a second class person because of anything, especially not because you're a student."

The Student Counseling Center, located on the second floor of the campus library is offering help to students through several services, which include:


