## Rebel Relics A blast from the past

October 21, 1986 (The Yellin' Rebel)—A UNLV campus survey discovered that many male students are attracted to "well-endowed" females. A majority of men claimed that personality was the most important aspect, but one student was honest enough to tell his priority. He was "attracted to a woman according to the amount of alcohol she has drunk. Because later, it really does not matter to either of us how she looks, as long as she is intoxicated."

October 23, 1987 (The Yellin' Rebel)—President Robert Maxson announced that the investigation into charges of corrupt recruiting practices of the men's basketball program would be turned over to Pacific Coast Athletic Association and the NCAA for further investigations.

October 24, 1989 (The Yellin' Rebel)—Junior Larry Johnson was voted Athlete of the Year by the Amateur Basketball Association of America.

October 22, 1991 (The Yellin' Rebel)—18-year-old UNLV student David Chew was arrested for attempted arson of the dorms. Along with the fourth-degree felony charge of arson, Chew was also booked for possession of a dangerous weapon and battery of a police officer.

October 22, 1991 (The Yellin' Rebel)—The brothers of Tau Kappa Epsilon held a blood drive in memory of fraternity brother Richard Johnson. Johnson died on October 18, 1990, from injuries sustained in a drinking and driving accident. Johnson was driving his motorcycle through and intersection when he was struck by a drunk driver who ran a red light.

October 24, 1991 (The Yellin' Rebel)—Freshman running back Henry Bailey "puts opponents in deepfreeze." In his first year at UNLV, Bailey led the team in receiving, third in rushing, second in overall scoring and also had the team's longest touchdown run as well as the longest touchdown catch.

October 20, 1992 (Rebel Yell)—College students who consume an average of 11 alcoholic drinks per week normally maintain low grades. Honor roll students consume an average of three times less than those with low grades.

October 22, 1992 (Rebel Yell)—According to the Newand Improved College Book, UNLV is a "great place to be gay." Two homosexual males at UNLV had an opposing view to that finding although one lesbian student agreed.

rassment charges) are groundless. As a policy, we don't teach harassing, but especially with young people who are very zealous for the church, some zeal may come across strong and can rub people the wrong way."

Nina Cooper, a professor of computer science and the advisor for Campus Advance, said during the meeting she was surprised at the action being taken by the board as she felt the group had not violated any rule of the UNLV Student Conduct Code.

Rodriguez answered the question of a violation to the Student Conduct Code saying that is against the rules for any organization to discriminate. "Homosexuals are not allowed in the church," he said, which is a form of discrimination.

Homosexuals, Rice responded, are allowed to attend church activities but allowing one to be baptized would be against their religious theology.

Rice did admit the Greater Las Vegas Church of Christ is affiliated with the Boston Church of Christ, although the group is now calling it the International Churches of Christ.

The Boston Church of Christ has been documented as being a recognized cult organization in such magazines as Congressional Quarterly. On Friday, the television program "20/20" did an exposé on the Boston Church of Christ, as known as the Boston Movement.

Rice, who viewed the program, said "those in the church who saw it were encouraged" because the reporter who investigated the story came to no conclusion, for or against the church, in the end.

The International Churches of Christ, Rice explained, sprung from what he called the mainline churches of Christ after the mainline became "sluggish." The two share similar doctrines, being nondenominational churches hoping to restore Christianity with an emphasis on evangelism and discipleship.

The International Churches of Christ teach that "every member of the church should be as committed to the church as the minister," Rice said. The church is attempting to "go back to the original form of Christianity in the First Century," Rice added.

The Greater Las Vegas Church of Christ was started in August of 1991, according to Rice. At that time, James Hammond was the minister of the church, and there were 30 members. As part of the growth in the church, Hammond was sent out by the San Diego Church of Christ to start the Las Vegas church. Current membership is currently about 130.

## Associate Dean to participate in Ghana program

Elaine Jarchow, associate dean of UNLV's College of Education, will spend the month of November helping establish an elementary education program in the African nation of Ghana.

Jarchow will travel to the University of Cape Coast, where she will assist in setting up a department of primary education. That department will be responsible for training teacher educators who, in turn, will train teachers to work in schools in Ghana.

Her role is to serve as a shortterm curriculum development consultant.

"I'm looking forward not only to sharing, but also to learning," Jarchow said. "Obviously, you go with some expertise, but I always think about how much you can learn."

Jarchow was chosen by the Mitchell Group, a contractor working with the U.S. Agency for International Development.

While in Ghana, she will help finalize plans for UNLV student Michael Maxwell to do his student teaching next spring at the American-run Lincoln Community School in Ghana's capital city, Accra. Maxwell is a senior majoring in education.

Jarchow said she also wants to work toward establishing a program through which UNLV faculty and their counterparts at the University of Cape Coast can work together on a variety of projects.

A link between the two universities already was established when Benjamin Eshun, who heads the university department where Jarchow will be working, spent three weeks at UNLV last spring as a visiting scholar.
