


### **UNLV** hosts Aggies for Homecoming

Saturday's battle between the Rebels and the Utah State Aggies looked like a promising game before the season started. Now the game is a battle for respect for both teams

The Rebels are coming off one of the biggest upset losses in school history, a 24-18 loss to Division I-AA Cal-State Northridge. Utah State lost a close game to Nevada last week, 48-44. Both teams are 1-5 overall. But the Aggies have lost three games by a total of 10 points. The Rebels lost



points.

A loss for either team would be the virtual end to any hopes of a conference title in 1993. The Aggies and Rebels, despite their poor overall record, are 0-1 in Big West Conference play and still in the hunt for the conference title and Las Vegas Bowl bid.

The Rebels have an added incentive as UNLV is celebrating homecoming. The scarlet and gray hold a respectable 16-9 homecoming record. The last time the Rebels hosted the Aggies on homecoming, Utah State beat UNLV, 28-10, in 1983

The Rebels will once again start sophomore Jason Davis at quarterback. Davis started against Cal-State Northridge but was pulled early by coach Jim Strong after completing only two-of-eight passes for 27 yards.

Last week was Utah State's homecoming as they dropped an offensive shootout to Nevada. The Aggies had led most of the game

their last three by a total of 57 before Nevada's Chris Vargas rallied the Wolf Pack from a 44-41 deficit. The teams combined for an astounding 1,189 yards in total offense.

The Aggies are led offensively by running back Profail Grier who ran for 127 yards and four touchdowns against the Wolf Pack. The Aggie quarterback is Anthony Calvillo, who has already reached the 1,900 yard mark and has thrown eight touchdown passes. Butkus Award candidate Jermaine Younger anchors the Utah State defensive corps from his linebacker position.

Game time at the Sam Boyd Silver Bowl is 7 p.m.

arms and soaked in the Las Vegas cheers.


It had to be a bittersweet feeling for Boney. Despite scoring 16 points, second on the Lakers behind James Worthy's 19-point effort, it is not thought that Boney has much of a chance to make the opening day roster as a shooting guard. After all, he was not drafted last June and signed a free agent contract last month after playing for the Lakers' summer league team.

"Dexter was great tonight," second-year Lakers coach Randy Pfund said. "He can run, play good defense and go strong to the basket. But as I've said before, he's up against a numbers game. We have a lot of guys that can play that two guard spot.

"I don't want to be overly optimistic and give a wrong picture. But he has worked extremely hard and has impressed a lot of people." Boney scored his 16 points on five-of-nine shooting from the

field, including two three-pointers. He also grabbed four rebounds in 20 minutes.
