Pfund, Lakers looking forward

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What a difference a year makes.

At this time last year, Randy Pfund was a rookie head coach whose players included former NBA champions Magic Johnson, Byron Scott, A.C. Green and James Worthy. Pfund, an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Lakers under both Pat Riley and Mike Dunleavy, was expected to have the benefit of coaching seasoned veterans in his first season as head coach of the Lakers.

All of that went out the window in a hurry. Before the first game, Johnson re-retired. Sam Perkins was traded to Seattle halfway through the season, Worthy lost his starting spot and Scott struggled to find his shot. The Lakers barely made the playoffs and many doubted if Pfund would see another October as head coach in L.A.

Pfund, whose Lakers were at the Thomas & Mack Tuesday practicing for their exhibition game against the Clippers, remembers last year clearly.

"It wasn't ideal," Pfund said. "You just have to learn to flow with it. We were expected to do everything from contend for the Western Conference title to finish in sixth place. We came in fifth but developed some young players and made a scare in the playoffs."

The Lakers extended the eventual conference champion Phoenix Suns to five games in the first round.

This year's Laker squad is an entirely new model. Gone are the aging veterans with championship experience. In their place are young, talented players with something to prove.

If the Lakers hope to make their annual playoff appearance again next May, some new faces must carry the burden.

Pfund expects big things from three players in particular. Center Vlade Divac, forward Elden Campbell and second-year guard Anthony Peeler must produce if the Lakers hope to win this season.

"Vlade must really step it up," Pfund said. "He improved his numbers in every category except shooting percentage last season. We need that kind of play from him.

"He, along with Peeler and Elden, must really score for us," Pfund said.

Pfund is also excited about second-year guard Doug Christie.

"Doug is a guy who could be slam dunk champion in this league," Pfund said. "He's really an exciting player."

While the new faces may play larger roles, Pfund still wants some quality minutes from the lone remaining player from the Lakers' 1988 World Championship team.

"James Worthy will be a leader for us. He'll play a 'statesman' role this season," Pfund said.


