Tommy Tune in town tonight

Multi-Tony Award winner Tommy Tune will be in Las Vegas tonight for a one-night-only gala benefit performance for Nevada Dance Theatre, 7:00 pm at the Artemus W. Ham Hall.

There are still a few tickets on sale for Tune's "Moonlighting!", a song and dance act where the ninetime Tony Award-winning star sings and taps his way through more than 20 musical numbers from Broadway and movies, accompanied by singer/dancers Robert Fowler and Frantz Hall and backed by a 16-piece orchestra.

Imagined as part of a great theatrical ritual, Tune begins the evening with Jerry Herman's musical philosophy "Tap Your Troubles Away."

After introducing Fowler and Hall in a musical medley, the three launch into the theme of the night, "Puttin' On The Ritz."

"The Way You Look Tonight," starts the Broadway song and dance routine that includes

"Blue Skies," "Don't Monkey with Old Broadway" and the classic Gershwin tune, "S'Wonderful." A salute to Hollywood ensues,

wherein they perform, among other tunes, "Can't Get Out Of This Mood," "You Go To My Head" and reenact the tragic tale of "Shanghai Lil." Following the company bow, Tune salutes the evening with "Top Hat."

Featuring a repertoire of songs from show business' most beloved composers - Cole Porter, George Gershwin and Irving Berlin -Tune's terpsichorean talents also pay homage to the stylish elegance of the great Fred Astaire. In between the songs and dances, Tune offers a cache of tall tales borrowed from the pages of his own illustrious career.

Tickets are also available for the premiere of "Anna Karenina at the Judy Bayley Theatre.

"Anna Karenina," the ballet based on Leo Tolstoy's classic novel, runs Thursday through Sunday. Performances are at 8:00 p.m. Thursday through Saturday and at 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. on Sunday.

"Anna Karenina" is choreo-

graphed by internationally known Andre Prokovsky. Some of Prokovsky's well-known ballets include his six full-length ballets "The Three Musketeers," "Dr. Zhivago," "Victoria," "Macbeth" and "The Great Gatsby.

Earlier this year, Prokovsky staged his Russian classicoriginally created for Salt Lake City's Ballet West-for the famed Kirov Ballet in St. Petersburg, Russia. Prokovsky, who had a successful career dancing with the London Festival Ballet and the New York City Ballet, is known internationally for his wide choreographic range.

Tickets for Anna Karenina range from \$13 to \$30 dollars and are available at the UNLV Performing Arts Center Box Office.

Tickets for Tommy Tune are available for \$75, \$50, \$45 and \$30. Gold Patron tickets to benefit Nevada Dance Theatre are \$125, which include a reception after the performance where the patrons may meet Tune. Platinum Patron tickets at \$250 include the reception plus an intimate supper with Tune at the Alexis Park Hotel.
