And the Records Came Tumblin' Down

In these most apathetic of times, it was no surprise that most of the 8,130 in attendance at Sam Boyd Stadium left following three quarters of blowout football Saturday.

The Rebels were down by 35 points, 45-10, enter-

ing the final quarter and the fans'interest was waning. Expect for those who chose to stay

a n d brave the random chants of "I-D-A-H-O, Idaho, Idaho, Go, Go, Go."

Rebel coach Jeff Horton promised exciting things when he was hired. But nobody expected UNLV's football team to start obliterating school and NCAA offensive records in its third game under him.

"It's really amazing," Horton said, matter-of-factly. "We've moved up so quick (in the statistics). We're up to second in passing and 17th in the nation in total offense. It's really a tribute to the kids picking up the system and getting it going.

"And really we feel, as a staff, that we haven't touched the tip of the iceberg yet, that we're just kind of still getting things

Imagine the record books (or what's left of them) when the Throwin' Rebels do get things in place. After all, UNLV did break numerous records. Among them: Randy Gatewood setting NCAA records for catches, 23, and receiving yardage, 363 yards...quarterback Jason Davis' 347 yards passing in the fourth quarter eclipsed Andre Ware's 340, set in 1989 . . . Henry Bailey's four touchdowns tied a UNLV mark.

The records came tumbling down in the fourth quarter, long after a majority of the crowd departed the stadium.

"I told people when I came here there was going to be some high-scoring games, don't leave," Horton said. "I've been a member of some of the greatet comebacks in college football history. We can do the same thing here. If people leave the stadium early, then they're stupid because there's going to be

Idaho Vandalizes Throwin' Rebels

FOOTBALL: Gatewood sets NCAA records for catches, yardage, named SI, BWC Offensive Player of the Week

The night should have belonged to Randy Gatewood.

But after establishing a slew of NCAA records he stormed off the field disappointed and bewildered, wondering if there was more he could have done to help UNLV avert a 48-38 loss to the Idaho Vandals Saturday before a crowd of 8,130 at Sam Boyd Stadium.

Gatewood shattered NCAA records for most receptions (23) and most receiving yards in a game (363). He was recently named Sports Illustrated's Player of the Week.

"I should be enjoying this, but I can't," he said after the Rebels fell to 1-2. "We're better than the way we're playing right now. We

just have to work harder."
Gatewood, who now leads the nation in receiving, set a Big West record with 419 all-purpose yards.

UNLV coach Jeff Horton expressed surprise at Gatewood's

"I had no idea that (Gatewood) had that many passes," Horton said. "He has a good awareness of what we want to do in our offense and he's tough physically. He's in good shape."

But Horton was still disappointed, as he repeated his post game comments from the previous week's loss.

"We're not that good a team to play this kind of football and expect to win," Horton said. "I know it sounds redundant but we really have to emphasize the fundamentals if we want to win the Big West."

The Rebel defense has gone



MIA, allowing Idaho, ranked No. 8 in Division 1-AA, 707 offensive yards.

The Vandals' offensive line allowed quarterback Eric Hisaw enough time to have a buffet while passing for 284 yards and rushing for 122 yards. Idaho built a 45-10 lead after three quarters.

Gatewood wasn't the only Rebel receiver who had a big game. Henry Bailey hauled in nine passes for 159 yards and four touchdowns. The pass became the Throwin' Rebels' only weapon as the ground game moved in retreat with a total of minus-21 yards rushing, a school record for fewest rushing yards.

Horton inserted Jason Davis at quarterback late in the third quarter. Davisignited the offense by completing 30-of-46 attempts for 381 yards and four touch-
