continued from 1 needed to become involved in rape prevention.

Reardon said he feels two things cause rape at the college level, "virginaphobia and homophobia." He detailed ways to combat rape on college campuses and encouraged men to talk to one another about the issue of rape.

Allen Robertson, a member of the UNLV National Organization for Women task force, said he was glad to hear a man talk about rape prevention. "Usually it's always women speakers at these events. It is too bad there aren't more men speaking up."

Reardon's man-to-man approach makes sense, Robertson said. "It's the whole Rush Limbaugh set. They hear the femi-Nazi cry and they hear another woman speaking about rape and they're just thinking, 'I don't want to hear her whining anymore.""

After Reardon's speech, a march was led through UNLV to point out unsafe areas.

The marchers walked north on Maryland Parkway and west on Cottage Grove, stopping at Myron Partridge Track. Event organizers told the marchers that campus officials had asked women to stay away from the track at night.

Sgt. Rochelle Sax from the Department of Public Safety was present at the march and said statistics don't show much violence at the track. "There is a big possibility of having crime on the track," Sax said.

"I believe what they were trying to do for both men and women was make a proactive stand and say don't come out here at night by yourself," she said. Sax pointed out that it is not a 24hour facility and is closed to everyone at times.

Members of the women's track team approached the marchers and told them the women's track team runs at night, but said the track is often not lighted.

Marchers also stopped at the reflecting pool by Alta Ham Fine Arts. The secluded area was pointed out as dangerous in the day time as well as at night.

Sax said vagrants and homeless people have been discovered in the area, which is surrounded by tall bushes. "The bushes make it almost like a little room that you can't access," Sax said of efforts to patrol the area.

Kathryn Parelman of the Women's Center said she felt the event, sponsored by CSUN, Student Activities, Residential Life, NOW, and the Women's Center, was successful.

"A lot of people walking by just suddenly stopped and listened. That's good when you reach a person who wouldn't have come to the event," Parelman said.

A candle-light vigil and moment of silence was held at the end of the march in Pida Plaza.




