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as they become what is known as a "slimer" (a person who works in a cannery) Their job: "sliming" (the act of gutting and processing fish).

Someone once asked me, "Are there trees in Alaska?" I retorted to him with a similarly stupid answer. "No . Only igloos and polar bears."

In Alaska, wildflowers flourish all over the state, such as Shooting Stars, the beautiful Sitka Rose, fireweed, and the Tundra rose to name a few, which help decorate the landscape with a variety of intense, beautiful colors, letting the power of summer make you know you're truly there at a special time.

There is a lot of history associated with Alaska. Anchorage got its name in 1914 because of its decent anchorage for ships. It is nestled between the Cook Inlet and the Chugach Mountains.

The Turnagain Arm was named by Captain Cook because when the ship sailed into the bay Captain Cook said, "Oh shit, we gotta turnagain." This is reportedly a true story.

Alaska is also home to Mt. McKinley, whose peaks tower at 20,320 feet, the largest in North America. It is also home to over

half the world's glaciers, which are melting at an alarming rate.

Sheep, caribou, grizzly Bear (inlandbear), moose, caribou, 150 species of birds, and over 400 wildflowers have been recorded at Denali National Park, which is 5,695,000 acres.

Other typical Alaskan animals include the Polar Bear, the Brown and Kodiak Bear, the Bald Eagle, the Humpback and Killer Whale, walrus, seals, Doll Sheep, mountain goat, salmon, and Ptarmigan, "The Alaska State Bird," to name a few.

During the summer months red , king and silver salmon, pinks, and chums can be caught out in the ocean and in the streams where they spawn. Halibut fishing is also favorite event, with fish weighing from 40 to 400 pounds. Sport and commercial fishing, oil, and timber are Alaska's main industry's.


I urge you to seek out, learn, and discover Alaska, "the Last Frontier" for yourself; it truly has something to offer everyone.
