ESL Offices on Final Trek to New Home

Students involved in the English as a Second Language Program are finding life easier with their lab's new location. With some of the classes held in the Flora Dungan Humanities Building and some in trailers CG-9 and CG-11, the trek from one to the other really bit the big one. Not so anymore. The ESL lab has been moved to FDH 237. This was done in a consolidation ef-

fort involving three of the Greenspun School of Communications labs, which now reside next door to each other on the second floor. Approximately 300 students are in the program. According to Arturo Aguirre, who works in the ESL office, many of those students use the computers for two to three hours per day in addition to their usual classes. "The programs available make practicing easier for the foreign students," Aguirre said. "They find it takes a lot more than just

going to class to master the English language." Two of the programs used in the lab are ALA, which uses microphones and recorders to aid in pronunciation and Roseta Stone, which lets students choose the correct answer from a number of pictures. This is one step in the right direction for the ESL program. In the near future (around the middle of February), the ESL offices will be moving up to the fourth floor of FDH, making it easier for all students.

Olscamp has held the president's position at Bowling Green State University since 1982. He was president of Western Washington State University prior to

acquiring the top spot at Bowling Green. Olscamp received his doctorate in philosophy from the University of Rochester in 1962. Shelton has been president of Eastern Michigan University since 1989. Prior to then he was vice-president of institutional advancement at Kent State University. Shelton received his doctorate in higher education administration from the University of Mississippi in 1975. The name of the next UNLV president is expected to be released by the regents during a special meeting at UNLV Feb. 17.
