# Governor Submits New Budget to Legislature

Gov. Bob Miller has submitted a 1995-97 biennial budget requesting a seven percent increase in faculty salaries and a onetime appropriation of \$7 million for need and merit-based scholarships.

Additionally, the budget calls for full funding of the instruction formulas which use faculty/student ratios to access how many faculty positions are needed based on the number of students enrolled.

Overall, education would re-ceive \$879.2 million, up from \$769.9 million.

Miller's budget, if passed by the Nevada State Legislature, would fund the instruction ratios for students absorbed in the University and Community College System of Nevada during the 1991-93 and 1993-95 biennium's as well as adjusting for a modest increase in enrollment during the 1995-97 biennium.

UCCSN Chancellor Richard Jarvis commented on the budget. "The governor's 1995-97 biennial budget for higher education addresses our major priori-

ties in the areas of instruction and capital improvement and moves our System forward on a number of other important fronts.

While UCCSN had requested \$40 million for technology and equipment, Miller's budget calls for only \$20 million.

"The fact is that our \$40 million request was modest as compared to our need, but we are happy that the governor has recognized technology for instruction, research and information delivery as a key part of higher education," Jarvis said.

Statewide, Miller's budget would provide a total of 239 new full-time faculty, 62 part-time faculty and 58 classified staff for Nevada's universities and community colleges.

Miller's budget was met with harsh criticism by UNLV Faculty Senate Chair Jim Stivers, who said the budget slights faculty who had not received a pay raise in four years.

"I've been here a long time and I lived through the freeze in the '80s," Stivers said. "The expectation going in (to the pay freeze of previous biennium budgets) was that we'd get a really nice bump coming out."

Stivers said the pay freeze of the '80s ended with an 11 percent pay increase, while current state employees are not expected to fare as well in the next two

"You sit there and you watch the three percent inflation compound year after year. Then you go three years with nothing and he says, 'we'll give you four per-

Miller's budget calls for a seven percent raise to be divided over two years.

Stivers said the Faculty Senate was not able to meet with Miller to express their views concerning the budget. "Nobody can get to the governor," Stivers said.

President Kenny Guinn was credited by Stivers as being instrumental in helping UNLV secure \$3 million toward the planning and constructing of a new library.

Stivers maintained he was still dissatisfied with the 1995-1997 biennium budget. "When you see a state run a surplus like it is and when you see them reallocate things, they're sending a strong message to higher education. The days of 'go,' 'go' expansion are over."






