# Severe Health Problems Plague Beam Hall Occupants

### Headaches, dizziness and nausea prompt officials to look at air quality

Reports of a variety of ailments have become commonplace complaints from office workers in Frank and Estella Beam Hall.

Symptoms, such as headaches, dizziness, nausea, sore throats and rashes have been reported by those who regularly inhabit the dean's office and the second and third floors.

According to Donna Evans and Olivia Saab, regular office staff in Beam Hall, the smell of cleaning agents, diesel fuel, exhaust fumes, cooking and even sewer odors permeate the building on a regular basis. Randi Smith, also a regular worker, stated that she was "healthy during breaks from work, but usually sick at work." When asked if they felt like they were breathing noxious fumes instead of fresh air, all three women said "yes."

The reports of these women were confirmed in an interview with Keith Schwer, director of the center for business and economic research. He stated that there were some problems with the odors and other assorted

"It is more than a coincidence that, when odors and fumes are strong, many office workers get sick in the building." In Schwer's opinion, who emphasizes his concern for public safety and health, "no windows result in poor air quality with no alternatives."

Schwer said that Brad Manning, occupational safety officer for the Environmental Health and Safety Department, had cooperated to get testing done. Manning informed Schwer, in his last communication, that "further testing is needed.

The offices where the complaints originated are those without windows, completely reliant on the ventilation system for fresh air. The symptoms have been around so long, workers stated, that no one knew for sure when it all actually started. Workers speculate the health problems started as soon as the building became occupied in .

One worker, who asked not to be identified, stated that Thomas Cassese opted for early retirement partly because of some health problems reportedly caused by the ventilation system. His health, however, has improved dramatically since retiring. This same worker felt the real problem was due to "a lack of funding to fix the building."

Further indoor air testing will be done by the Indoor Air Division of the Harry Reid Center under the direction of Muhilan Pandian, a research chemical engineer and Ed Furtaw, an environmental engineer.

According to Furtaw, there is a design defect in the construction of the building involving the close proximity between the air intake for the ventilation system and the exhaust system for the whole building.

Both the air intake and the exhaust system are right next to each other on the outermost corner of the building by the baseball field. Trucks bringing food supplies for the hotel administration programs always deliver right under the air intake outside the building.

The exhausts from the building and the trucks pose a health risk, as the noxious fumes are drawn in the air intake for the building. Wind currents were also thought to help fumes circulate back into the building when blowing in the right direction.

According to Schwer, the air exchange rate for the building has been adjusted and is better now than it was in the past.
