Expanding Your Horizons" Comes to UN

Approximately 400 girls will come to UNLV for the annual "Expanding Your Horizons" in Science and Math Conference, scheduled for March 11.

Girls in grades six through 12 will attend the conference, designed to meet the specific needs of each age group.

According to Kathy Lauckner, a quality assurance specialist at the Harry Reid Center who cochairs the event with Joyce Nelson-Leaf, director of the Education Equity Research Center, the goal is to "reach the female population in schools to get them interested in science and math, putting the girls in a forum absent of 'peer pressure."

According to the brochure on the event, the aim is not only increasing young women's interest in math and science, but also to foster awareness of career opportunities for women by providing them with an opportunity to meet and form personal contacts with women in nontraditional occupations. It also points out that not all occupations in Las Vegas involve casinos and ho-

Over 30 workshops are scheduled for the group to help arouse interest in science and math related careers. Some of the workshops are "Romancing the Stone-Geology," "Electric Auto Repair-An Electrifying Career" and "A Business of My Own-Entrepreneurship." All of the workshops have hands-on training avail-

"The best thing about the workshops is the hands-on opportunity to see what people really do in that occupation," Lauckner explained, "(from) the tools they use to the experience the job of-

Organizations that help every year with the conference include groups like: the American Association of Business Women, the Society of Women Engineers and the Professional Black Women's Alliance. These and other sponsors have all volunteered their time to the conference.

Lauckner and her co-chair expects the event to be "a wonderful conference. It is one of the best extracurricular activities a young girl can do, sponsored by UNLV, and should be promoted by the Clark County School District

more than it has. This is also a good opportunity for girls to find out that not all jobs in Las Vegas are hotel-based. We hope that the children come away from the conference with the knowledge that there is more open to them."

Girls regularly stop taking math and science courses at an earlier age than boys, according to a UNLV press release memo. The long-term effect of that sudden disinterest is that girls have less career opportunities open to

The "Expanding Your Hori-

zons" Science and Math Conference is an effort by many women to ensure that girls will have more exposure to those areas. According to the press release, minority girls are becoming involved as a result of intensive recruiting efforts to bring them to the conference.

Parents and teachers are also scheduled to attend the adult portion of the conference. Laucknerstated that "parents or guardians are welcome at the confer-

Many local businesses have

helped with the expenses such as: Desert Research Institute, EG&G Energy Measurements, Inc., and Port of Subs. Others include the Dwight D. Eisenhower grants through the Math/Science Act, the Nevada State Department of Education, and the Department of Energy grant through the Nevada Department of Education.

He also mentioned the awarding of scholarships to UNLV students. "This year we awarded \$42,000. Each year the scholarship amounts vary depending on the success of our fund raising."

 Child of Alumni Scholarships three awarded each year at \$1,000 per year.

·Orange County Scholarshiptuition waiver for applicants from Orange County, Calif.

·Outstanding Thesis-awards \$200 yearly.

·Student Alumni Association Scholarship-awarded \$5,000

 Strand Scholarship—one per year of \$1,500.
