
Grad to Dance with Ririe-Woodbury

The Ririe-Woodbury Dance Company will perform at the Judy Bayley Theatre this Saturday, Feb.18 at 2 p.m. and 8 p.m. The dance company is one of Salt Lake City's most popular dance companies (S.L.C. is renowned for its world class dancers) and they have been praised by both the New York Times and Wall Street Journal. The dance company is named after its founders who founded the dance company in 1952. They wanted the company to have a continuous thrust into new choreographic directions, with an emphasis on humor, theatricality and inventive use of media. What better place to find such a creative dance company than Salt Lake City. Salt Lake City with its strong base of religuous cult members and western pioneers has long been a city known for its concentration of multi-talented

So without using the most obvious set of lyrics, which contain catch words and phrases such as "Cyberpunk", "jack in," "Chiba," "Virtual Reality," "interactive," "hacker," and "netrunner," how can the essence of Cyberpunk be captured? Well, if you take irreverence, and think what it results

in, we have chaos, anger, cold-

ness, uncertainty, and a prevail-

ing negative outlook.

Industrial has been defined as "noise-making" or music meant to disrupt the peaceful state of mind. The initial definition that I had heard was "a hybrid of techno and heavy metal." I once asked this question on the Inter-

net newsgroup (rec.music.industrial) and I was criticized heavily for stating my original understanding. In any case, most bands that have been labeled as being "industrial" seem to extensively use synthesizers and distorted guitars.

I am of the opinion that Cyberpunk music is of either a calculating and scintillating beat, which heightens your excitement to the point where the depressing lyrics hold you in perspective, or a raucous and uncontrollable rage of distorted guitars (A harmonious din, as I like to put it) which draw you into a seething anger. Here are some bands which I believe are true to the word.

>Front 242. A Belgium-based band that originated in 1981. Besides being my favorite band, I find their recent work to be a homage to chaos and technology. Their best Cyberpunk track: "Sacrifice" from Tyranny For You (1991)

Nine Inch Nails. Trent Reznor and his touring crew tore through Thomas & Mack last October. With their three albums, the first being Pretty Hate Machine, Broken (EP), and The Downward Spiral, Nine Inch Nails have become the most commercially successful industrial band to date. Their best Cyberpunk track: "Wish" from Broken (1992).

>KMFDM. Another band from Europe; similar in style to Front 242, but more vocal. I find their vocals, which are sometimes in German, to be quite irritating, but their guitarists are fairly good. Their best Cyberpunk album: Naive.

>Front Line Assembly & Skinny Puppy. Don't know where these guys are from, haven't heard too much of their stuff, but from what I hear, they are very good industrial bands. One FLA album that I heard a few very good cuts from is called Tactical Neural Implant. I've heard stories about Skinny Puppy; they have supposedly slashed their audience with razor blades. other forms of cyberpunk

Cyberpunk affects the way one sees things, and consequently, fashion is a prime example. Some decidedly Gothic attire: black fatigues, combat boots, many loose layers of grays and blacks to cover your upperbody, fishnet gloves, figure-hugging materials . . . basically anything to darken your complexion. Some exotic Gothic fashion shows are held in various cities throughout the world. Finding these accessories is quite a task, but it is possible.

The attitude to carry? People interpret rebellion in different ways, but a good thought to have which will get you far in life is to apply the old cliches: question authority and never take things for what they are. Look past the pidgeon-holing, and motivate yourself to find the truth to everything. The consequent belief is to trust only yourself.

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
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
