SCOPE to help endangered and threatened species

A Walk For Wildlife is being sponsored by Students Conscious of Protecting the Environment on Saturday, March 11 at 3 p.m.

Participants will gather at the Alumni Amphitheatre for the one mile round-trip walk on Maryland Parkway. The event is open to the public and is free of charge.

The UNLV-SCOPE Walk For Wildlife is designed to help students and the community become more aware of endangered and threatened species. It is also one of many similar walks across the country sponsored by other environmental groups such as the Student Environmental Action Coalition.

The Endangered Species Act, passed in 1971, helps protect animals and plants from extinction. According to Liz Butler, vice president of SCOPE, "We want to show that the ESA is an issue concerning everyone, not just those who can afford it. Right now(it) is under attack in Washington by corporate special interests. People need to protect the ESA, because the ESA protects

continued from 1 if the committee will look into Boixo's role.

"This is an independent committee," Hollenbeck was quick to point out. "I know of its existence because I asked for it to be formed."

The committee will be headed by Larry Golding, who is also the head of the current parking committee. Golding, a professor of kinesiology, said he was approached by Hollenbeck to establish the sub-committee.

"He was concerned, since the article suggested he did something inappropriate," Golding said. "I told him we would look into it to see if anything was done wrong."

When asked what the scope of the investigation would be, Golding said it wasn't going to be a long investigation.

"We just want to look at the paper work to see if anything was done incorrectly," Golding says. "We're not going to do any in-depth investigation or anything."

The committee says it will follow the paper trail regarding Boixo's tickets and make a decision on whether or not Hollenbeck and Ackerman acted inappropriately.

"The accusations The Rebel Yell wrote are serious and I want people to know I didn't do anything wrong," Hollenbeck said. "And, frankly, I have the evidence to prove it."
