Orlando led the audience in a sing-along to "You Gotta Have Heart" after whetting the audience's appetite with "Tie A Yellow Ribbon."

After the show, at the Extra Innings party, this reporter

Where are the priorities in the UNLV athletic department? While the university felt obligated to give Rollie Massimino \$1.88 million to not coach this year's Runnin' Rebels, the school couldn't even up some cash so acting coach Cle Edwards could move his things out here from St. Louis, his former residence.

Schizophrenic Rebs Close Regular Season at Home

Basketball: Curtis, Manuel, Savoy to be honored on Senior Day

The UNLY men's basketball team attempts to break its sixgame losing streak by returning to the Thomas & Mack Center for its final two conference games.

The Runnin' Rebels (9-15, 5-11 in the Big West) face UC Santa Barbara at 7:35 p.m. tonight and Long Beach State at 7:35 p.m. Saturday.

The Rebels, who have spotted their last few opponents big leads, before attempting comebacks, are at a collective loss to explain the team's schizophrenic play of late.

"It's a great question, believe me," assistant coach Dave Rice said. "If we could put our finger on it, we would have done so a long time ago. We joked after last game (an 84-83 loss to Pacific) and said 'Maybe we ought to come out and play a five-on-five team scrimmage for about 20 minutes before the game starts. Maybe that can get us started."

Junior guard Damian Smith, coming off a career-high 30 points, thinks the Rebels may be taking some teams too lightly.

"We get up for real big games-New Mexico (State), Virginiateams like that we really get up for," Smith said. "We ought to be able to get up for every game— Pacific, (Cal State) Fullerton, or whoever. We've got to be ready to play from the tip, no matter who the opposition is."

With a preliminary-round

game in the conference tournament already assured for UNLV, as well as the probability of the team's first losing season since the 1958-59 season, the two up-coming games could be regarded as meaningless for the Rebels. However, Rice said the games do carry some importance.

"I really don't think they're meaningless for two reasons," Rice said. "I think it's important that we get some kind of momentum going into the Big West Tournament-number one. And then number two, I think it's meaningful in the sense that, even though we will have to definitely play on Thursday (in the tournament), it makes a difference as to whether or not we play (as) the number-seven position, or the number-eight position.

"I think for our confidence it would be nice to come out and, not only beat Santa Barbara, but to beat Long Beach, because right now Long Beach is leading the conference, and a win like that would be a great confidence booster for us heading into the

Big West Tournament."

It would also be a nice way for seniors Mike Curtis, Reggie Manuel and Patrick Savoy to end their collegiate careers at Saturday's Senior Night festivities.

Manuel, coming off a weekend that saw him score six points in two games, will be needed if UNLV is to make any noise.

"I think it's just a matter of him just deciding that he's got a minimum of three games left in his career, and hopefully seven or eight," Rice said. "When he's played well, we've done a better job of getting him involved early in the game. ... I think that's one of the things we're going to have to do is get Reggie involved."

UCSB enters tonight's game with a record of 13-11, 8-8 in conference. Senior center Doug Muse leads the Gauchos with a 13.3 ppg average.

LBSU comes into Thursday with a record of 17-7, and a first-place record of 13-3 in conference play. Senior center Joe McNaull leads the 49ers, averaging 12.2 ppg,

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starting its rally.

The Rebels finally cut the lead to one, 74-73, off a Kebu Stewart offensive rebound, but could never break through to seize the lead. Damian Smith, who scored a

career-high 30 points, led the Rebels' charge with 24 points in the second half. Smith was 10-15 from the field, including 7-10 from 3-point range.

"I'm trying to do something," Smith said. "I'm trying to get us back to winning. Whatever it takes, whatever I can do nowadays.

Stewart, who sat out the first 10 minutes of the game after he and Sunshine missed the team bus to the shoot-around earlier in the day, scored 18 points, 15 in the second half, and pulled down 10 rebounds.

Clayton Johnson, a native of Stockton, Calif., who originally committed to UOP out of high school, contributed 12 points in

his homecoming. Reggie Manuel, who has seemingly vanished from the Rebels' offensive scheme, managed just four points-on the heels of a twopoint performance at SJSU.

Manuel refused to comment

Wednesday, but interim coach Cle Edwards thought he might know why Manuel continues to struggle.

"Normally when a player gets to his senior year, his position is already etched in stone," Edwards said. "Well, Reggie has to do a lot of different things. Reggie has to be a point guard; Reggie has to be a two-guard; Reggie has to be a team leader. Sometimes he has to play inside. So it's really hard for him to concentrate and focus on one position."

SATURDAY: It was more of the same as the Rebels fell behind early to the Spartans, then clawed their way back, before falling short 86-75.

UNLV trailed by 20 points, 53-33, with 17:52 remaining before starting its comeback.

Using an 18-1 run, the Rebels pulled to within two points, 62-60, with 7:59 left. UNLV pulled to within one, 75-74, with 1:45 left after Stewart hit one of two free throws.

Once again though, UNLV couldn't get over the hump to grasp the lead, getting outscored down the stretch 11-1.

Brad Quinet led the Spartans with 24 points. Jahi Bacon and Darren Greene added 14 apiece.

Stewart paced the Rebels with 19 points. Patrick Savoy added 18 points and eight boards.
