Hooray for Hollywood! The glitz and glamour comes to life at the Debbie Reynolds Hollywood Movie Museum located at 305 Convention Center Drive.

For the young and old alike, the collection on display at Reynolds' museum is sure to tickle your fancy.

During the 1950s, Hollywood and Broadway introduced America's sweetheart sensation Debbie Reynolds.

She has been featured in thirty seven motion pictures, and the lead in three Broadway productions. Many of us may remember her in the classic film Singin' In the Rain.

"My Hollywood is gone. What remains must be preserved and protected," explains Reynolds. "It is a heritage left to us by the great costume and set designers form the true Golden Age of Hollywood."

The museum now houses Reynolds' private collection worth over \$30 million. She obtained many of the artifacts and costumes through her dedication and love of the Hollywood era.

Entering the museum, a mini-

sized movie theater, spectators enjoy a thirty-five minute multimedia program. It features film clips form a variety of classic films, and also showcases several costumes from each clip. Reynolds' life size image delivers a very personal narration.

Upon exiting the movie theater, patrons view more of the fabulous Hollywood era that includes Judy Garland's pinafore dress and ruby slippers from the Wizard of Oz, the subway dress worn by Marilyn Monroe in The Seven Year Itch, and Barbra Streisand's beaded gown from Hello Dolly.

Daily tours of the museum are every hour on the hour from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. The price is \$7.95.

Equally entertaining at Reynolds' Hotel is "Jazz and Jokes" every Friday and Saturday night from 10 p.m. - 1 a.m. Reynolds along with her co-hosts Jimmy Cesar and the legendary Rip Taylor invite friends to an openmic to tell jokes or sing along with the Joey Singer Trio.

Together, Reynolds and her entourage make for a fun-filled personable evening. A food menu and bar service is available in this elegant but comfortable setting.


