continued from 11 less you make a mistake, and subscribe on accident, you won't need to type "U" because all of the groups are unsubscribed to, by default.

After you are done with this extremely lengthy process, type "Q" just to make sure the groups don't get yanked in. Re-enter Tin, by typing "tin" and pressenter to

select a newsgroup of your choice. You will see many posts with subject headings, such as "\*\*\*Top Five Movies of All Time\*\*\*" and "—Green Day Sucks!—."

Be warned: if lewd or indiscreet language offends you, then look very carefully at the subject heading. If it appears suspiciously juvenile or immature, you may want to use the "CTRL-K" command to kill the thread. Threads are composed of one original message, and a series of follow-

ups from other readers. To post your own message, type "W," and you will get an e-mail-like header and body format full screen editor. The only difference between Tin and Pine is that you must hit "CTRL-C" to cancel, and "CTRL-X, enter, enter" to save. If you wish to talk to the writer of a thread, simply press "R," and their e-mail address will automatically be placed in your "To:" field. To follow-up to a post, press "F."

Be careful ... if you sound naive or simply stupid, you should expect to be "flamed." Being flamed is part of the newsgroup experience. Some people will violently disagree with you, and will fill your mailbox or the thread with obscenities directed to you. If you want to, you can wage war, and continue the flame wars, but usually nobody wins.

#### MUD

Dungeons & Dragon players had to make their presence known on the Internet to some capacity, and MUDS (Multi-user Dungeons) were the result. These time-consuming sites of adventuring can provide you with real-time human adversaries and friends. Basically, you can talk to adventurers, kill monsters, and get magical items. There are variations on MUDS, but the last pointer I'll give to you is to type "telnet pr.mese.com" at the home prompt. Good luck!

Lynx

The World Wide Web is a fastly growing graphical interfaced version of a "Gopher" (which is nearly identical to a www site). You can find graphics, pictures, and sounds by obtaining "Netscape" or "Mosaic." Too expensive? Well, other than the mediocre shareware program, "Slipknot," you don't have much of achoice, other than using Lynx. Type "lynx" at the home prompt. To go to a site, type "G." You will be prompted for a location.

Try "http://www.ifi.uio.no/ -terjesa/front242/main.html" and this will take you to a homepage (Front 242 is my favorite band). Here, you can find lyrics, album reviews, and interviews by using the cursor keys. Sites can be found on the various news-
